RECOMMENDATION

Staff Recommends That The City Council Adopt A Resolution Amending Resolution No. 86226 C.M.S. Regarding Oakland Fund For Children And Youth (OFCY) Grants For Children And Youth Services To (1) Delete "San Francisco Bay Area Council, Learning For Life" As The Awardee Of Grants ID Numbers 73 And 74, And (2) Add The Award Of Grants ID Numbers 73 And 74 To Bay Area Community Resources And Safe Passages, Respectively, In The Same Amounts And Terms.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Staff requests that City Council adopt a resolution to amend City Council Resolution No. 86226 C.M.S. to substitute two qualified lead agencies to manage two program grants declined by original grantee Learning for Life, in a total amount of \$144,000 for Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-2017. City Council adopted the Oakland Fund for Children and Youth (OFCY) Planning and Oversight Committee's (POC) 2016-2017 grant awards in June 2016, with four school-based after school grant awards to Learning for Life, an affiliate agency of the San Francisco Bay Area Council of Boy Scouts of America. Learning for Life has since declined the program grants at three of the four elementary school sites for the 2016-2017 school year.

On July 6, 2016 the OFCY POC approved the replacement of Learning for Life and the substitution of Safe Passages as lead agency at Laurel Elementary and Bay Area Community Resources as lead agency at Fruitvale Elementary to coordinate and provide after school services at the schools.

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BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

OFCY grant awards for FY 2016-2017 were approved by the City Council Life Enrichment Committee on May 24, 2016 and adopted by the City Council on June 6, 2016 (Resolution No. 86226 C.M.S.). Learning for Life was approved for four program grants for services at the following OUSD elementary school sites: Carl B. Munck Elementary, Fruitvale Elementary, Laurel Community Partnership Academy, and Manzanita SEED Elementary.

However, Learning for Life made a determination to decline the OFCY program grants at three of four school sites, citing a shift in the agency's focus away from lead agency services and responsibilities and budgetary concerns. The Learning for Life program at Manzanita Seed will continue for one year due to the strong relationship between staff and school site leadership. OFCY, in partnership with OUSD and school site leadership, has selected and the POC has approved the following lead agencies to substitute for Learning for Life and to provide after school services in 2016-2017:

- Bay Area Community Resources (BACR) at Fruitvale Elementary
- Safe Passages as lead agency at Laurel Community Partnership Academy

The POC also approved substituting the YMCA of the East Bay as lead agency at Carl B. Munck Elementary. The after school provider at Carl B. Munck will be forwarded to Council for adoption at a later date.

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ANALYSIS AND POLICY ALTERNATIVES

The two agencies proposed for substitution in place of Learning for Life are longtime providers of after-school services at OUSD through funding provided by OFCY, and are current OFCY grantees in good standing. These two agencies participated in the Request for Proposals (RFP) process conducted by the POC for the current three-year (2016-2019) grant cycle. They were found to be qualified, and were approved by the City Council on June 6, 2016 for grant awards to operate school based after school programs at 21 other OUSD elementary and middle school sites (Resolution No. 86226 C.M.S.). If this proposed resolution is approved, the existing contract award amounts and scope of services for the two organizations will be amended to include the two additional school sites. Each program grant award involved here is \$72,000 for FY2016-2017.

City Council adoption of the POC's amendment to Resolution No. 86226 replacing grantee Learning for Life in grant award Nos. 73 and 74 with the two proposed substitute lead agencies will allow 180 students to have access to free or low-cost after school programming during the 2016-2017 school year and ensure continued implementation of the After School Education and Safety grants at the two school sites.

OFCY's School-Based After School funding strategy has been developed over the past ten years in close partnership with OUSD to support local non-profit agencies as lead agencies providing a coordinated after school delivery system at elementary and middle school sites. OFCY funds support school sites with higher need as evidenced by Free / Reduced Lunch (FRL) rates of 50 percent and above. To receive OFCY funds lead agency applicants must be contracted by OUSD to receive State After School Education and Safety (ASES) funding. OFCY grants provide the local matching funds for the state funds and the financial support for lead agencies to deliver quality after school academic and enrichment programming.

Lead agency after school providers at elementary school sites receive approximately \$94,000 in ASES funding through OUSD and \$72,000 through OFCY. Without OFCY funding, agencies are unable to commit to provide after school services at the school sites. Furthermore, the schools would be unable to meet ASES performance requirements, possibly making the school sites ineligible for State funding for programming and leading to loss of future ASES funding to OUSD for the school sites.

OUSD has developed new ASES contracts with the two providers for the Fruitvale Elementary and Laurel Community Partnership Academy school sites where Learning for Life has declined OFCY program grants. The agencies began providing services at the start of the 2016-2017 school year with an expectation of City approval of OFCY funding by October, 2016.

OUSD also reached initial agreement with the YMCA of the East Bay to provide services at Carl B. Munck Elementary School. However, OUSD terminated the agreement and is reviewing options for after school services at the school.

Item: _____ Life Enrichment Committee October 11, 2016 An alternative would be not to approve the new lead agencies and for staff to develop and release an additional RFP for these sites. While this would allow more time for other agencies to potentially develop partnerships with school site leadership, a reduction in after school services at the three sites for a portion or likely all of the 2016-2017 school year would also occur. OUSD would be at risk of losing future state ASES funding support for after school programming at the sites. Therefore, the alternative is not recommended. Due to the challenges of planning, administration, and staffing for after school programming, qualified lead agencies are not willing to start services in the middle of the school year at a new school site, making the award of a partial grant for a portion of the school year an unviable alternative.

FISCAL IMPACT

There is no impact on the General Fund. The recommendation forwarded by the Planning and Oversight Committee is in accordance with the requirement to set aside three percent of unrestricted general fund revenues annually to the Kids First Children's Fund. Table 2 below is a breakdown of the appropriated project funding sources.

PUBLIC OUTREACH / INTEREST

The POC held a noticed public meeting on July 6, 2016 at Oakland City Hall to receive the staff recommendation and to approve the POC's recommendation for forwarding to Oakland City Council. The recommended policy action will positively impact students and families attending Laurel Community Partnership Academy and Fruitvale Elementary.

COORDINATION

This report and legislation have been reviewed by the Office of the City Attorney, Controller's Bureau, and Contracts and Compliance Division of the City Administrator's Office.

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PAST PERFORMANCE, EVALUATION AND FOLLOW-UP

OFCY grant programs are evaluated annually by an independent contractor. Program targets for youth enrollment, hours and duration of service, and types of activities are captured in the Cityspan grants management database and assessed in the annual evaluation process. OFCY's evaluation of school based after school programming demonstrates that after school programs help students stay engaged in schools, develop positive academic behaviors and improve study skills, and improve school attendance and decreases chronic absenteeism.

Bay Area Community Resources (BACR) administered OFCY grants for school based after school programs at 21 sites during the last school year (FY 2015-2016), with grant awards totaling \$1,497,000. Across all programs, BACR enrolled 3,543 students (129 percent of annual goal) and provided 1,274,379 hours of service to the students (114 percent of annual goal).

Safe Passages administered OFCY grants for school based after school programs at five sites during the last school year (FY 2015-2016), with grant awards totaling \$395,000. Safe Passages enrolled 902 students (132 percent of annual goal) and provided 220,817 hours of service (122 percent of annual goal) across the five school sites.

In 2016-2017, programs will be evaluated for performance based on goals for enrollment and hours of service. Programs are expected to meet performance goals, with minimum satisfactory performance defined as meeting 80 percent of annual performance goals. The annual evaluation report for 2016-2017 will be presented to Oakland City Council for adoption in October 2017.

SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

Economic: OFCY funding will provide employment opportunities through two lead agencies funded to operate the three after school grant programs. These agencies employ local staff and have a positive economic impact. In addition, OFCY funds are used to leverage and match additional local, State, Federal and foundation funding sources, and thereby brings additional resources into Oakland.

Environmental: The two after school programs will provide gardening, nutrition, and cooking classes to the elementary students to teach about planting and harvesting; scientific methods of research, testing and experimentation; and to learn about food systems and cooking healthy food for healthy lifestyles to provide a positive environmental impact on youth development.

Social Equity: OFCY's School Based After School strategy supports programs operating at school sites where the majority of students (50 percent or above) are eligible for free and/ or reduced lunch (FRL). The programs provide free or low-cost after school services, prioritizing services for low-income families. In 2014-2015, Laurel Community Partnership Academy and Fruitvale Elementary schools had FRL rates exceeding 75 percent.

REGARDING OAKLAND FUND FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH (OFCY) GRANTS FOR CHILDREN AND YOUTH SERVICES TO (1) DELETE "SAN FRANCISCO BAY AREA COUNCIL, LEARNING FOR LIFE" AS THE AWARDEE OF GRANTS ID NUMBERS 73 AND 74 AND (2) ADD THE AWARD OF GRANTS ID NUMBERS 73 AND 74 TO BAY AREA COMMUNITY RESOURCES AND SAFE PASSAGES RESPECTIVELY, IN THE SAME AMOUNTS AND TERMS

WHEREAS, Measure K/Kids First! Initiative established the Oakland Fund for Children and Youth ("OFCY") in 1996 (renewed in July 2009 as Measure D) to help young people grow to become healthy, productive, and honorable adults; and

WHEREAS, the Planning and Oversight Committee ("POC") provides oversight and direction for the OFCY planning and funding review process; and

WHEREAS, in November 2015, the POC published a Requests for Proposals (RFP) based on the adopted OFCY Strategic Investment Plan 2016-2019 and conducted an "open and fair" competitive review process for the selection of grants for the OFCY 2016-2019 grant cycle; and

WHEREAS, through the RFP process in June 2016, the City Council approved four OFCY grant awards for school based after school services to the lead services agency Learning for Life (Resolution No. 86226 C.M.S.) to support the priority area of Student Success in School; and

WHEREAS, the agency Learning for Life declined the grant awards for after school services at the two schools listed on Grant ID lines 73, and 74 of Council Resolution No. 86226 C.M.S. and in the matrix below; and

WHEREAS, staff has selected substitute lead agencies from among those entities which have competed in the recent OFCY RFP process and have already been selected as qualified to provide services in the School Based After School strategy; and

WHEREAS, on July 6, 2016, the POC approved the substitution of these two qualified agencies to manage the two program grants declined by Learning for Life, and is submitting the change to City Council for adoption; and

WHEREAS, the POC recommends the substitution of two qualified agencies to manage the two program grants declined by Learning for Life listed in Grant ID lines 73 and 74 of Council Resolution No. 86226 in the amounts specified below for Fiscal Year (FY) 2016-2017, and as renewable with City Council approval for FY 2017-2018 and FY 2018-2019; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That Resolution No. 86226 C.M.S. is hereby amended as follows to change the grantees for Grant ID Nos. 73 and 74:

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Council approves the allocation of \$144,000 from Kids First! Oakland Children's Fund (1780) Youth Services Organization (78251), Account Services Contracts (54912), and FY 2016-2017 OFCY Contract (P485230) for the specified OFCY grants in lines 73 and 74 for FY 2016-2017; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Administrator is authorized to execute agreements with the aforementioned service providers in the amounts specified above in lines 73 and 74 for a total amount not to exceed \$144,000 for FY 2016-2017, and is authorized to conduct all negotiations, execute and submit all documents, including but not limited to applications, agreements, amendments, modifications, payment requests, and related actions which may be necessary in accordance with the basic purpose of this resolution without returning to City Council; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That said agreement(s) shall be approved as to form and legality by the Office of the City Attorney and placed on file in the Office of the City Clerk.
