#### RECOMMENDATION

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

(Attachment A) to this report provides information on crime, crime trends, and crime reduction and crime intervention activities in Oakland for the period of July 1 to September 30, 2016.

#### **BACKGROUND AND LEGISLATIVE HISTORY**

In 2013, the Public Safety Committee requested a quarterly report from OPD on crime trends and crime reduction activities in the City of Oakland. This report is provided four times a year and updated to include the preceding three-month period (January to March; April to June; July to September; and October to December).





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## Area 4: Shootings

- Most shootings are gang related... not random.
- Gang members are engaged by law enforcement with custom notifications and other resource opportunities.
- Partnerships with OHA for intelligence sharing.
- Internal partnerships with other area commanders to de-conflict and collaborate efforts.

## Area 4: Robberies

 More robberies occur between Monday and Thursday in the afternoon to late evening hours.

- This may be due to the BART station location coupled with hours of transit.
- Victims are typically on foot or getting in or out of a vehicle.

# Area 4: Robbery Trends (1)

- Multiple suspects in stolen vehicles
- Physically searching victims during robberies
- Targeted Items:
  - Money
  - Cell phones
  - Jewelry
  - Electronics (laptops, notebooks, and so on)

## Ceasefire Violence Reduction Strategy Update

- OPD Activities
- Adult Case Management

### Ceasefire Goals

- Reduce shootings and homicides through respectful direct communication and followthrough with those at highest risk of violence.
- Decrease recidivism and incarceration rates of individuals participating in interventions.
- Strengthen police-community relations.

#### Ceasefire Direct Communication

- Most recent Call-In completed October, 2016.
- Next Call-In scheduled for November, 2016.
- Custom Notifications continue with appropriate modifications.
- Direct communication (since 2012) with approximately 700 individuals during Call-Ins and through Custom Notifications.

#### **OPD Ceasefire Activities**


- Weekly Shooting Reviews.
- Partnership with the Probation
   Department more robust global positioning system (GPS) monitoring and compliance checks.
- In-depth Ceasefire training provided both internally and externally.
- Bi-monthly coordination meetings with the Human Services Department.




## July-2016 Direct Communications & Group Member Involved Shootings & Homicides

## Ceasefire Police Legitimacy/ Procedural Justice

- Police Legitimacy/Procedural Justice Training completed for all sworn OPD personnel;
   Training continues with professional staff.
- OPD partnered with Stanford University and the State Attorney General's Office to develop statewide <u>Principled Policing</u> training.
- OPD has presented Procedural Justice
   Training to 15 local agencies and the expanded Principled Policing Course to more than 25 law enforcement executives throughout California.

#### **Pilot Evaluation**

#### **NEED FOR PILOT EVALUATION**

- New case management contracts began in January 2016
- No Measure Z evaluator until December 2016
- HSD monitors aggregate service statistics (i.e. demographics)
- HSD has <u>restricted</u> access to individual-level participant information – an evaluator is needed to do deeper analysis

#### INTERIM PILOT EVALUATION PLAN

- Goal: gain a stronger understanding of how case management services are rolling out and preliminary outcomes
- HSD significantly revised and sped up a grant-funded evaluation
- Conducted file reviews to ensure data quality and use of new standardized assessments and tools
- Pilot will inform program development, data collection and future evaluation





#### **Client Ranking of Employment Needs (n=73\*)**




