RECOMMENDATION

Staff Recommends That The City Council Accept This Follow Up Report Regarding The Oakland Police Department's (OPD) Use Of Scorecards As Part Of The Ceasefire Program.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

At the March 14th 2017 Public Safety Committee staff was directed to provide a more detailed example of the scorecard form used by OPD Ceasefire personnel. Attachment A to this report provides an example of a real scorecard used by OPD personnel in the Ceasefire program.

BACKGROUND AND LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

In 2013 the Public Safety Committee requested a quarterly report from OPD on crime trends and crime reduction activities in the City of Oakland. This report is provided four times a year and updated to include the preceding three-month period (January to March; April to June; July to September; and October to December).

ANALYSIS AND POLICY ALTERNATIVES

The scorecard is used by the OPD's Ceasefire Program staff to keep a record of ongoing violent gang and group activity and serves as a mechanism for intervention.

The scorecard in *Attachment A* covers the period of October 20, 2017 through December 31, 2017 (the first period begins on October 20, 2017 because that date follows a previous Ceasefire call-in¹); the three repeating columns are "20-31" (for October, 2017), "Nov," and "Dec" (November and December 2017). The four column types are as follows:

- NF Victim = non-fatal victim;
- Hom Victim = homicide victim;
- NF Suspect = non-fatal suspect; and
- Hom Suspect = homicide suspect.

The Group column represents real gangs and groups identified as connected to shootings and homicides; the letters assigned in this version of the scorecard (i.e. "A, "B") represent actual groups/gangs/cliques/sets that were active during the coverage period. The value of the scorecard is that Ceasefire personnel can actively monitor increases or decreases in shooting activity by each of the identified groups/gangs/cliques/sets. A point is added to the scorecard for each victim (or intended victim) from groups/gangs/cliques/sets under the victim categories (non-fatal or homicide) as well as for each suspect from groups/gangs/cliques/sets connected to each incident. Therefore, one individual shooting occurrence may result in a higher score if there are multiple victims and/or multiple suspects. The scorecard total of 78 in *Attachment A* is the sum of these many variables, and is not reflective of 78 separate shootings. This scoring system evident in the scorecard example helps focus limited resources on groups/gangs/cliques/sets that are the most active.

OPD's Ceasefire personnel start new scorecards for each period after call-ins. This process results in scorecards that roughly follow the quarterly periods of the quarterly crime reports presented four times each year to the City Council's Public Safety Committee.
