RECOMMENDATION

Staff Recommends That The City Council Receive A Semi-Annual Informational Report from the Finance Department on City Efforts to Apply for, Accept and Appropriate Grants Over \$50,000 from Private, Local, State and Federal Sources, for the Period Beginning January 1, 2017 and Projected through June 30, 2018.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Per City Council's request, the purpose of this report is to provide a semi-annual report to Finance & Management Committee detailing staff efforts to secure funding through grants that are greater than \$50,000. This report and its attachments list all awarded, pending, in process, and declined grant applications, for the period beginning January 1, 2017 and projected through June 30, 2018. Grant applications and awards are broken down by department in *Attachments* **A-1 through A-11.** and include grants from private, local. State and Federal sources.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

During a presentation on the State and Federal budgets at Finance & Management Committee on January 24, 2017, members of Committee expressed a desire to receive a periodic report on the City's efforts to secure grant funding. The requested report would include pending and upcoming grant applications that are being developed or considered by the City's various departments, as well as past efforts to secure grant funds.

Oakland Municipal Code Section 2.04.160, and Resolution No. 79714 C.M.S., grant the City Administrator limited authority to accept and appropriate restricted grant funds, gifts, and donations of up to \$50,000 without City Council action, provided that:

- The grant, gift, or donation does not create unbudgeted costs to the City;
- The grant, gift, or donation is for a program or project that has been approved by the Council in the biennial, mid-cycle, or Capital Improvement Program (CIP) budget or by City Council legislation during the fiscal year;

- The grant, gift, or donation is for a specified purpose (e.g., food for OPD canine unit, Annual Senior Volunteer Recognition event, Mayor's Toy Drive, etc.);
- The grant, gift, or donation is used in accordance with any restrictions and/or special conditions of the grantor agency or donor; and
- Specific approval by the legislative body is not required by the grantor or donor.

In addition, the ordinance authorizes the City Administrator to expend monies derived from restricted gifts/donations that exceed \$50,000.00 without City Council action when the gift has been approved, accepted and appropriated by City Council resolution provided such expenditure is in accord with any restrictions or special conditions of the grantor/donor.

The City Administrator already provides a detailed annual report to the City Council on all gifts and donations accepted under the authority granted through this ordinance (i.e., grants and donations of \$50,000 or less). Therefore, the following report and accompanying attachments will primarily focus on prospective, in-process, submitted, awarded, appropriated, and unsuccessful grant applications, from January 2017 through June 30, 2018, for grants greater than \$50,000. Please note that a few grants in the report are lower than the \$50,000 threshold, since they do not meet the criteria for acceptance through Oakland Municipal Code Section 2.04.160.

ANALYSIS

Grant Process Overview

This report and accompanying attachments detail the efforts of City staff to secure grant funding from various sources. While each grant program differs in terms of requirements and process, these efforts are generally conducted along a similar grant application and council approval process for each grant opportunity. The steps in this process correspond to the application and council status fields in the report attachments, and are described below to provide additional context for the report.

Step One - Grant Search

A grant is an award of funds given by one entity to another to perform a specific service, activity, or achieve a specific goal. As a local government entity, the City of Oakland is eligible to apply for and receive grant funding from various sources. These sources include the Federal government and its agencies (e.g., the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development); the State of California and its various departments (e.g., Caltrans); local jurisdictions (e.g., Alameda County or the Bay Area Air Quality Management District); or private and corporate philanthropic foundations (e.g., the East Bay Community Foundation).

City department leadership and staff learn of new grant opportunities from various sources that can include: notifications from current funders, partners, and stakeholders; funder-issued announcements or newsletters; funder agency websites; or online search engines like grants.gov, the Federal Registry, Foundation Center, and CA Grants Watch. City department staff, in coordination with the Citywide Grants Coordinator, proactively search for opportunities that fulfill a need for the City, and for which the City and its departments meet eligibility criteria.

These relevant opportunities are categorized as **prospects**. Prospects discovered by the Citywide Grants Coordinator are shared with the appropriate department, and vice versa.

Grant opportunities and prospects are also identified through the State and Federal budget and legislative processes. The Citywide Grants Coordinator and Department staff, in coordination with Townsend Public Affairs, Inc. (TPA), track relevant budget and policy legislation that could provide potential funding sources at the local, State, and Federal level. For example, this year the City worked with TPA to advocate for additional State resources for affordable housing. These efforts, in coordination with other jurisdictions, advocates and stakeholders, resulted in SB 2, which establishes a permanent funding source for affordable housing through a \$75 real estate transaction fee; and SB 3, a \$3 billion general obligation bond for affordable housing programs that will go to the State ballot in 2018. These laws may provide funding opportunities for the City for years to come; as such, staff will continue to track these and other laws for future grant opportunities.

Step Two - Grant Application

Funders generally announce grant funding availability from as early as four months to as late as four weeks before the grant's deadline. When a grant opportunity is announced, the funding agency provides grant program guidelines it will use to select grantees. Guidelines describe program eligibility requirements, goals, desired impact, and allowable uses of grant funds. Guidelines are often contained in documents called the Request for Proposals (RFP), the Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA), or the Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO). Once a prospect is identified, Department leadership and staff extensively review the grant's guidelines and priorities in the RFP to see if there is a "fit" with their Department's programs, services, or projects. If the Department identifies a program, service, or project in need that would be competitive for the grant, staff will secure approval from Department leadership to apply for the grant. Upon approval, an application or proposal is started, and is considered **in process**. Sometimes, Department staff and leadership determine that a grant opportunity is not a good fit based on need or competitiveness. The Citywide Grants Coordinator will work with staff to track these opportunities for which the City **did not apply**.

Each grant application varies in the type, quantity and quality of information required of applicants. Some applications take a few days or weeks complete; others take three – six months and may require input from multiple partners and stakeholders. However, each application requires extensive staff time and capacity to complete in the days and weeks leading up to the grant deadline. As such, staff are encouraged to coordinate with the Citywide Grants Coordinator for support with their applications.

Once a grant application or proposal is completed, it is submitted to the funding agency by the deadline indicated in the grant RFP. At this point, the grant is considered **Submitted**, **Pending Decision**. Once the funder receives the grant application, it undergoes an extensive review process to evaluate an application's effectiveness in addressing the grant's goals and scoring criteria. This process can take months to complete. Once a decision is made, funders will notify grantees of a grant award with a formal award letter and/or grant agreement. If the City receives formal notification of award regarding a grant application, the grant is considered **awarded**. If the City is notified that it was not selected for funding, the grant application is considered **declined**.

Step Three - Grant Appropriation

Grants over \$50,000 awarded to the City from any public or private source must generally be approved and appropriated by the City Council for funds to be spent. Grants can be appropriated by Council in two ways: either through the City's biennial budget process (**Appropriated, Biennial Budget**), which includes grants awarded prior to the enactment of the City budget; or through the Council resolution process (**Appropriated via Resolution**) which requires Council to revise the City's budget for grants awarded after the enactment of the City budget.

To get a grant accepted and appropriated by Council via resolution, department staff must submit a draft resolution and report on the acceptance of the grant award for Council consideration. It can take upwards of four weeks to schedule a grant staff report and resolution for Council consideration. Oftentimes, staff will initiate the Council report prior to the grant's submittal. If there's a quick turnaround time, staff may present the report and resolution after the grant is submitted.

Council resolutions are required to accept and appropriate grant funds, since the acceptance of the grant alters the City's budget. Once the grant is accepted, department fiscal staff work with the City's Budget Bureau to fully appropriate the funds. The appropriation is complete once all the required forms are completed, the grant agreement is signed, and all documents including the adopted resolution are received by the Budget Bureau. Once the appropriation is complete, an account for the grant is created, and staff can request, draw down, and spend grant funds.

Grant Decision Making and Project Prioritization

Decision making and project prioritization for grants also varies on a case-by-case basis, often determined by each grant program's unique funding guidelines, priorities and timeline. Typically, staff considers the following criteria when prioritizing programs or projects for a grant application:

- Competitiveness: Does the proposed program, project or service meet the eligibility criteria for the grant? Will the proposed program, project, or service rank highly per the grant's scoring criteria? Does the proposed program project or service align with the grant's goals, desired outcomes and timeline? Does the department have adequate resources available to leverage for matching fund requirements?
- Department Impact: Will the grant support a need or goal of the department, or of a related City plan or priority? Does the department have the capacity and/or expertise to implement the grant within the grant's timeline? Are there other budgetary impacts if the grant is accepted?
- Community Impact: Will the grant benefit a community or communities in Oakland?

If the department identifies a program, service, or project in need that would be competitive for the grant, supports a need in the department, is fiscally sustainable, and positively impacts the community, the department will apply for the grant. However, it's important to note that these criteria only serve as guidelines for grant decision-making and project prioritization, as each grant opportunity is different from the next. A program/project's competitiveness may vary greatly from one grant program to another. Oftentimes, projects or programs considered for a

grant application may dramatically improve a community, but may not be the most competitive option for a specific grant's funding criteria. If a project does not rate highly on a grant program's scoring criteria, it most likely will not be funded. Therefore, staff will often consider the competitiveness of a project first (i.e. project aligns with the funder's grant requirements and goals, has access to adequate matching fund resources, etc.) before considering other criteria when prioritizing projects for grant applications.

A great example of this is the application of the parks prioritization list. Every two years, Council develops a priority list of parks projects for funding. These projects are considered the most critical and needed parks capital projects in the City. However, some of the projects on the list may be new, or lack an adequate preliminary project design and concept for a grant proposal. These projects will always be less competitive for grant funding than projects that have completed pre-development, finalized project designs, or secured relevant environmental clearances. Therefore, park projects from previous park prioritization lists that are more shovel-ready may be selected for grant applications over projects that are on the current list.

Grant Status Overview

From January 1, 2017 through October 16, 2017:

- 66 grants were awarded, amounting to \$99,518,047 received or appropriated by the City of Oakland. This includes \$9,959,427 from 13 new grants.
- 8 applications, totaling \$10,543,704, were submitted and pending an award decision from the funder.
- 13 applications, totaling \$13,755,000, are in process of being developed for submission.
- 10 applications, for a total of \$9,537,508, were declined for funding by the granting agency.
- Staff have also identified 12 grant prospects, potentially worth over \$21,000,000, that will be explored and considered over the coming months.

Awarded Grants: Awarded grants are grants that were successfully awarded to the City of Oakland and its various departments. Most of these awards were from recurring grants, which are grants that were received in the past and may be provided on a recurring basis. Human Services Department receives the bulk of its funding from recurring State and Federal grants. This includes the US Department of Health and Human Services' Head Start Program (\$16,229,284), which supports very young children (birth to three years old) and their parents with parenting education, prenatal, and school readiness services. The Department of Transportation is also heavily grant funded from recurring local and State sources. The department received \$23,901,000 through 11 grants from the Alameda County Transportation Commission's Comprehensive Investment Program (CIP) for various road improvement, bicycle/pedestrian, and sidewalk/streetscape projects. Housing and Community Development receives annual formula-based awards from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development's entitlement grants that include the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnership grants, Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA), and Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG). This year, Housing and Community Development received \$12,229,282 through these formula grants.

Pending Grants: Pending grants are grants and applications that have been submitted and are pending a funding decision from the funder or funding agency. Currently, most of the City's pending grant applications were submitted by Oakland Public Works, Human Services Department, and Oakland Fire Department. Oakland Public Works has \$6,532,303 in pending grants that include applications to: The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to address storm damage from 2017 (\$3,782,303); CA Natural Resources Agency for tree planting and pedestrian improvements at Raimondi Park (\$2,250,000); and the CA Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery for illegal dumping mitigation (\$500,000). Human Services Department has \$1,303,866 pending for HUD's Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness Program (PATH) to provide housing subsidies for homeless people. Oakland Fire Department has \$1,166,911 pending, primarily for the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI), which is used to strengthen the City's emergency response, coordination, and recovery capabilities (\$1,050,000).

In Process Grants: In process grants include applications that are being developed for submission and funding consideration. The Oakland Department of Transportation (DOT) and Oakland Public Works have the most applications in process. For the Department of Transportation, there are 7 applications in process. Five of these applications, totaling \$10,000,000, are for bicycle and pedestrian improvements in and around proposed transit oriented affordable housing developments through the CA Strategic Growth Council's Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities (AHSC) program. For Public Works, there is a \$2,250,000 application in the works for the California Office of Emergency Services for a creek restoration and flood mitigation project.

Declined Grants: Declined grants include applications that grantors declined to award. Departments that had most of the City's declined applications include Oakland Fire Department, Oakland Public Works, and Oakland Police Department, Oakland Fire Department had five unsuccessful applications. Most notable of these was an application for FEMA's Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grants (\$3,769,096). Oakland Public Works had two applications that were declined for funding, which includes a \$1,000,000 application for a City Tree Inventory and Urban Forest Master Plan; and a \$1,000,000 for capital improvements and a synthetic field at Raimondi Park. Oakland Police Department submitted two unsuccessful applications: one for \$807,000 to combat human trafficking; and another for \$493,172 for radiological/nuclear threat detection devices for officers patrolling the Port. Generally, a grant application is derried funding because it did not score highly enough on a grant program's scoring criteria, compared to other applications, to receive an award. Most grant programs, especially those from State and Federal agencies, are highly competitive, and may only award a few grants for the entire State or Country. As such, a decision may firmly rest on the strength of the entire applicant pool, and not just on the strength of one department's application. However, it's important to note that this report provides information on 84 grants that were submitted by the City, totaling nearly \$120 million. Of these, only 10 applications were declined, for approximately \$9.5 million in funding. This indicates that the City has exhibited great success with its grant applications.

This is an informational report and there are no direct fiscal impacts associated with the acceptance of this report.
