Community Outreach and Education

2017 Highlights





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Fairyland welcomed 7,548 children and adults on free field trips in 2016/2017, with chartered bus transportation for more than half of these visitors. Teachers appreciate the trips because they reinforce classroom lessons, bonding among students, and interest in stories and reading.

Fairyland provided more than **1,800 free individual admissions and 60 free year-long family memberships** so children from under-served communities could enjoy the same informal learning opportunities as their more affluent peers. One of these new members is raising a 5-year-old grandson who had experienced unspeakable trauma. She wrote,

Every year, our donor-funded Junior Animal Caretakers program allows four children who have experienced trauma or are living in foster care to work with animals in the safe, predictable surroundings of Fairyland while guided by our education director and animal caretaker. By the end of the program they report a greater sense of purpose and self-worth.



Science learning abounds at Fairyland. Education Director Teresa Deberry shows students what animals need to thrive in Science Alive!, a Next Generation Science Standards-based curriculum that served more than 700 Oakland Unified School District kindergarten and first-grade students last year.



During weekly Toddler Storytime, librarian-trained volunteers combine reading aloud with singing and movement to promote early literacy and family engagement. Last year we were able to leverage grant funding to include book giveaways.
