RECOMMENDATION

Staff Recommends That The City Council Adopt A Resolution Authorizing The City Administrator To Award A Construction Contract To Ray's Electric, The Lowest Responsive And Responsible Bidder, in Accordance With Project Plans And Specifications For The Pedestrian Lighting And Sidewalk Improvements On International Boulevard (SR 185) From 2nd Avenue To 107th Avenue Project (1000844) And With Contractor's Bid In An Amount Of Seven Million Three Hundred Eighty-Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety-Three Dollars (\$7,388,993.00).

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Approval of this resolution will authorize the City Administrator to award a construction contract to Ray's Electric, in the amount of Seven Million Three Hundred Eighty-Eight Thousand Nine Hundred Ninety-Three Dollars (\$7,388,993.00) for the construction of the Pedestrian Lighting and Sidewalk Improvements on International Boulevard (SR 185) from 2nd Avenue to 107th Avenue Project (1000844). Due to a grant funding deadline, a contract must be approved by City Council prior to May 31, 2018 in order to meet the funding obligation date. The work is located in Council Districts 2, 5, 6 and 7 as shown in Attachment A.

BACKGROUND/LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The Pedestrian Lighting and Sidewalk Improvements On International Boulevard Project (1000844) will provide a safer walking experience for pedestrians along the entire International Boulevard (from 2nd Avenue and 107th Avenue) corridor in conjunction with the East Bay Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) project, as it will draw many pedestrians to the corridor. While the BRT project included improvements for pedestrians, it did not provide pedestrian lighting and sidewalk improvements for the entire corridor.

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The City of Oakland applied for and was awarded a \$2,481,000.00 federal Active Transportation Program (ATP) grant. The grant was approved by City Council Resolution 85106 C.M.S. on July 15, 2014 as shown in *Attachment B*. Additional funds in the amount of \$726,050.00 were awarded from the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program (AHSC). The AHSC grant was approved by City Council Resolution 85414 C.M.S. on February 27, 2015 as shown in *Attachment C*, with a clarifying project specific resolution expected to be approved by City Council on April 17, 2018. Additional funding of \$3,891,943.00 will be provided from Measure KK Bond Funds allocated in the 2017-2019 City Budget & Capital Improvement Program; and \$290,000.00 from the Sewer Service Fund for trash capture devices.

ANALYSIS / POLICY ALTERNATIVES

The Pedestrian Lighting And Sidewalk Improvements On International Boulevard (SR 185). From 2nd Avenue To 107th Avenue Project (1000844) was advertised for bids on March 9, 2018 and the initial bids were due on April 5, 2018. However, at the initial mandatory pre-bid meeting on March 20, 2018, only one prospective bidder attended the meeting. To encourage competitive bidding the City removed the mandatory pre-bid attendance requirement, allowed voluntary & conference-call pre-bid attendance, and added an additional contracting licensed type to bid as a prime contractor. The City also extended the bid opening to April 12, 2018 and held a second pre-bid meeting on March 27, 2018. Four prospective bidders (Ray's Electric, Tennyson Electric, Redgwick Construction and Bay Construction) attended the second pre-bid meeting. These construction companies expressed intent to bid on the project.

As an ATP grant requirement, the construction contract must be awarded by the City prior to May 31, 2018. If the City misses the deadline, the City is at risk of losing the grant. As a result of the bid opening extension, the award of the construction contract is impacted pushing the award schedule beyond the May 31st grant deadline.

On April 12, 2018, the City Clerk received 2 bids for this project as shown below:

In order to meet the funding deadline, staff requests that the City Council approve the resolution authorizing the City Administrator to award a contract to Ray's Electric, the lowest responsive

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and responsible bidder as deemed by Contracts and Compliance Bid Analysis. The Bid Analysis is anticipated to be ready by April 27, 2018, in time to award the contract before the May 31st funding deadline. The grant source is federal funds, and therefore federal Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) requirements apply instead of City LBE/SLBE programs.

The project consists of the installation of pedestrian light poles and fixtures, pull boxes, electrical conduit, electrical conductor, replacement of damaged sidewalks and driveways, and other minor incidental items including tree root pruning and curb and gutter replacement. A portion of the proposed work is within Caltrans right-of-way and requires the Contractor to abide by Caltrans encroachment permit requirements.

The contract specifies \$1,242.00 in liquidated damages per calendar day if the contractor exceeds the contract completion time of 250 working days. Construction work is anticipated to begin in fall 2018 and should be completed by late fall 2019 contingent on weather conditions.

The Engineer's Estimate for the base bid work is \$2,069,200.00 as listed in the Notice to Bidders. The Engineer's Estimate for the base bid work and alternates is \$4,480,978.00. The award will be based on the lowest total of base bid and bid alternates amount which is also listed in the Notice to Bidders.

The bids exceeded the Engineer's Estimate, but staff has reviewed the submitted bids for the work and has determined that the bids are reasonable for the current construction climate. The economy has improved dramatically, contractors are in short supply, and commodity prices have increased accordingly. The resulting bids reflect the current conditions and consequently increased costs to the City.

To fully fund the construction contract, which exceeds both the Engineer's Estimate, staff proposes dedication of funding from sources that are currently available and appropriate for this project as detailed in the Fiscal Impact section of this report.

PUBLIC OUTREACH/INTEREST

Per standard City procedures, a notification letter will be sent to residents prior to start of construction.

During the engineering design phase, staff met with the BRT project team and coordinated the proposed improvements with the BRT improvements. Most of the work falls within Caltrans right-of-way and City has obtained Caltrans Encroachment Permit to make the improvements.

COORDINATION

The Office of the City Attorney and the Budget Bureau has reviewed this report and resolution.

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3. FISCAL IMPACT:

Funding for the contract is available in the current FY 2017-2018 and the FY 2018-2019 adopted budget. Although the contract will be executed in FY 2017-2018, work and contracts payments will begin in the FY 2018-2019, after July 1, 2018. The City will also execute a standard agreement and a disbursement agreement with the State for the AHSC funds as shown in Resolution 87133, attached as **Attachment E.** Approval of the resolution will authorize the City Administrator to execute a construction contract in amount of \$7,388,993.00.

PAST PERFORMANCE, EVALUATION AND FOLLOW-UP

Contractor Performance Evaluation for Ray's Electric from a previously completed project was satisfactory and is included as *Attachment D*.

SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

Economic: This project will improve transportation conditions and make the International Boulevard corridor safer, well lit, and more attractive. The project improvements will enhance the efficiency and affordability of the transportation network and increase the potential for economic and housing development in the neighborhood.

Environmental: The project will provide a safer route for pedestrians in the International Boulevard corridor and therefore reduce the use of automotive mode of transport that causes air pollution. The project includes stormwater management features such as inlet trash screens that will improve the water quality and reduce trash entering into the City's stormwater system and waterways. The project will implement the Best Management Practices for the protection of storm water runoff during construction to prevent pollutants from entering the storm drain systems.

Social Equity: This project is intended to provide maximum mobility for those without access to vehicles by improving the pedestrian infrastructure, including Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility



RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO:

- (A) APPLY FOR, ACCEPT AND APPROPRIATE UP TO SEVENTEEN MILLION THREE HUNDRED ELEVEN THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED SIXTY DOLLARS (\$17,311,160.00) IN ACTIVE TRANSPORTATION PROGRAM FUNDS ASSIGNED TO THE METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION;
- (B) COMMIT MATCHING FUNDS OF UP TO SIX HUNDRED FORTY SEVEN THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED SIXTY DOLLARS (\$647,460.00) FROM MEASURE B (FUND 2211) GRANT MATCHING FUNDS

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland ("City") is submitting an application to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission ("MTC") for Seventeen Million Three Hundred Eleven Thousand One Hundred Sixty Dollars (\$17,311,160.00) in funding assigned to MTC for programming discretion, which includes federal funding administered by the Federal Highway Administration ("FHWA") and federal or state funding administered by the California Transportation Commission ("CTC") such as Surface Transportation Program ("STP") funding, Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement ("CMAQ") funding, Transportation Alternatives ("TA")/Active Transportation Program ("ATP") funding, and Regional Transportation Improvement Program ("RTIP") funding, herein collectively referred to as Regional

Discretionary Funding, for the following projects:

International Boulevard Corridor Pedestrian Projects

- International Boulevard Pedestrian Lighting and Sidewalk Repair Project (\$2,481,000.00)
- International Boulevard Pedestrian Refuges Project (\$602,120.00)

Safe Routes to School-type Projects

(herein referred to as Projects) for the Active Transportation Program ("ATP"); and

WHEREAS, the Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act (Public Law 112-141, July 6, 2012) and any extensions or successor legislation for continued funding (collectively, MAP 21) authorize various federal funding programs including, but not limited to the Surface Transportation Program (STP) (23 U.S.C. § 133), the Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ) (23 U.S.C. § 149) and the Transportation Alternatives Program (TA) (23 U.S.C. § 213); and

WHEREAS, State statutes, including California Streets and Highways Code §182.6, §182.7, and §2381(a)(1), and California Government Code §14527, provide various funding programs for the programming discretion of the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and the Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to MAP-21, and any regulations promulgated thereunder, eligible project sponsors wishing to receive federal or state funds for a regionally-significant project shall submit an application first with the appropriate MPO, or RTPA, as applicable, for review and inclusion in the federal Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); and

WHEREAS, MTC is the MPO and RTPA for the nine counties of the San Francisco Bay region; and

WHEREAS, MTC has adopted a Regional Project Funding Delivery Policy (MTC Resolution No. 3606, revised) that sets out procedures governing the application and use of Regional Discretionary Funding; and

WHEREAS, the City is an eligible sponsor for Regional Discretionary Funding; and

FURTHER RESOLVED that, in the case of an RTIP project, Projects is included in a local congestion management plan, or is consistent with the capital improvement program adopted pursuant to MTC's funding agreement with the countywide transportation agency; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the City is an eligible sponsor of Regional Discretionary Funding funded projects; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the City is authorized to submit an application for Regional Discretionary Funding for the Projects; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that there is no legal impediment to the City making applications for the funds; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that there is no pending or threatened litigation that might in any way adversely affect the proposed Projects, or the ability of the City to deliver such Projects; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the City authorizes its City Administrator, or designee to execute and file an application with MTC for Regional Discretionary Funding for the Projects as referenced in this resolution; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the MTC is requested to support the application for the Projects described in the resolution, and if approved, to include the Projects in MTC's federal TIP upon submittal by the project sponsor for TIP programming; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council hereby appropriates funds in an amount not to exceed \$17,311,160.00 that are received for these Projects under the ATP Program into the MTC Program Fund (Fund 2163) under project numbers to be established; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council hereby consents the use of up to \$647,460.00 in matching funds for the Laurel Access to Mills Maxwell Park and Seminary Active Transportation Connections Project from Fund 2211 (Local Street and Roads, Grants Matching Fund); and be it

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO APPLY FOR, ACCEPT, AND APPROPRIATE GRANT FUNDS FROM THE CALIFORNIA STRATEGIC GROWTH COUNCIL IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$15 MILLION UNDER THE 2014-15 AFFORDABLE HOUSING AND SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES PROGRAMS, AND ALLOCATE SUCH FUNDS TO ELIGIBLE PROJECTS WITHOUT RETURNING TO COUNCIL

WHEREAS, the California Strategic Growth Council ("SGC") announced a notice of funding availability ("NOFA") for the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program established under Division 44, Part 1 of the Public Resources Code (PRC) (commencing with Section 75200) (the "statute"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the statute and pursuant to direction of the SGC, the California Department of Housing and Community Development ("HCD") is authorized to approve funding allocations utilizing monies made available by the State Legislature to the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program, subject to the terms and conditions of the statute and the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Guidelines to be adopted by SGC in January 2015; and

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland wishes to submit an application to obtain an allocation of Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities grant funds from HCD for the amount not to exceed \$15 million for the development of affordable housing; and

WHEREAS, there is substantial need for additional funds for the development of affordable housing; and

WHEREAS, on September 3, 2014, the City issued a Notice of Funding Availability soliciting applications for funding for affordable housing developments; and

WHEREAS, seven developers submitted proposals in response to the Notice of Funding Availability but only four were funded; and

WHEREAS, no matching funds are required for the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities program; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to delegate authority to the City Administrator or his or her designee to allocate funds to projects that meet the criteria for the

Affordable Housing and Sustable Communities Program and to negotiate and enter into an agreement or agreements with the selected developers without returning to Council; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVEO: That the City Administrator, or his or her designae, is authenzed to submit an application to the 2014-15 California Strategic Growth Council Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program for up to \$15 million in grant funds; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Administrator or his or her designee is authorized to accept the California Strategic Growth Council Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program fonds, if awarded, deposit said funds in the Affordable Housing Trust fund (Fund 1870), Housing Development Organization (89929), Project (TBD), appropriate said funds in an amount not to exceed \$15 million, and allocate funds to projects that meet the program criteria without returning to Council; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Administrator is authorized to negotiate and execute the Standard Agreements and any amendments therato between the City and the California Department Housing and Community Development for this program; and be it

FORTHER RESOLVED: That said agreements shall be reviewed and approved by the City Attorney's Office for form and legality prior to execution, and copies will be placed on file with the City Clerk; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That if the application for funding is approved, the City hereby agrees to use the Affordable Housing and Sustainable Community Program funds for eligible activities in the manner presented in the application as approved by California Strategic Growth Council and in accordance with the regulations of the program; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City Council hereby appoints the City Administrator and his or her designee as agent of the City to conduct negotiations, execute documents required by HCD, and take any other action, including negotiating amount, terms, and conditions of the loans to the developers, with respect to the California Strategic Growth Council Affordable Housing and Sustainable Community Program consistent with this Resolution and its basic purpose.

The Resident Engineer will prepare the Contractor Performance Evaluation and submit it to the Supervising Civil Engineer. The Supervising Civil Engineer will review the Contractor Performance Evaluation to ensure adequate documentation is included, the Resident Engineer has followed the process correctly, the Contractor Performance Evaluation has been prepared in a fair and unbiased manner, and the ratings assigned by the Resident Engineer are consistent with all other Resident Engineers using consistent performance expectations and similar rating scales.

The Resident Engineer will transmit a copy of the Contractor Performance Evaluation to the Contractor, Overall Ratings of Outstanding or Satisfactory are final and cannot be protested or appealed. If the Overall Rating is Marginal or Unsatisfactory, the Contractor will have 10 calendar days in which they may file a protest of the rating. The Public Works Agency Assistant Director, Design & Construction Services Department, will consider a Contractor's protest and render his/her determination of the validity of the Contractor's protest. If the Overall Rating is Marginal, the Assistant Director's determination will be final and not subject to further appeal. If the Overall Rating is Unsatisfactory and the protest is denied (in whole or in part) by the Assistant Director, the Contractor may appeal the Evaluation to the City Administrator, or his/her designee. The appeal must be filed within 14 calendar days of the Assistant Director's ruling on the protest. The City Administrator, or his/her designee, will hold a hearing with the Contractor within 21 calendar days of the filing of the appeal. The decision of the City Administrator regarding the appeal will be final.

Contractors who receive an Unsatisfactory Overall Rating (i.e., Total Score less than 1.0) will be allowed the option of voluntarily refraining from bidding on any City of Oakland projects within one year from the date of the Unsatisfactory Overall Rating, or of being categorized as non-responsible for any projects the Contractor bids on for a period of one year from the date of the Unsatisfactory Overall Rating. Two Unsatisfactory Overall Ratings within any five year period will result in the Contractor being categorized by the City Administrator as nonresponsible for any bids they submit for future City of Oakland projects within three years of the date of the last Unsatisfactory overall rating.

Any Contractor that receives an Unsatisfactory Overall Rating is required to attend a meeting with the City Administrator, or his/her designee, prior to returning to bidding on City projects. The Contractor is required to demonstrate improvements made in areas deemed Unsatisfactory in prior City of Oakland contracts.

The Public Works Agency Contract Administration Section will retain the final evaluation and any response from the Contractor for a period of five years. The City shall treat the evaluation as confidential, to the extent permitted by law.

WHEREAS, the State of California, Strategic Growth Council, and the Department of Housing and Community Development (the "Department") issued a Notice of Funding Availability ("NOFA") dated January 30, 2015, as amended, under the Affordable Housing Sustainable Communities Program (the "AHSC Program"); and

WHEREAS, as authorized by City Council Resolution 85414 C.M.S. on February 17, 2015, Satellite Affordable Housing Associates ("SAHA") and the City applied for AHSC Program Funds, and were awarded an AHSC Program loan in an amount not to exceed \$2,239,705 (the "AHSC Loan") and an AHSC Program grant in an amount not to exceed \$823,025 (the "AHSC Grant"), for an aggregate amount not to exceed \$3,062,730 under the above described NOFA for use in connection with the Camino 23 affordable housing project at 1233-1253 23rd Avenue and portions of 2285 International Boulevard (the "Project"); and

FURTHER RESOLVED: That the City is hereby authorized and directed to incur an obligation for the AHSC Grant, and that in connection with the AHSC Grant, the City is authorized and directed to enter into, execute, and deliver a State of California Standard Agreement in an amount not to exceed \$823,025 and any and all other documents required or deemed necessary or appropriate to carry into effect the full intent and purpose of this Resolution, in order to evidence the AHSC Grant, the City's obligations related thereto, and the Department's security therefore, including, but not limited to, a disbursement agreement, a covenant and certain other documents required by the Department as security for, evidence of, or pertaining to the AHSC Grant, and all amendments thereto (collectively, the "AHSC Grant Documents", and, together with the AHSC Loan Documents, collectively, the "AHSC Documents"); and be it
