Re: RESOLUTION OF THE OAKLAND CITY COUNCIL IN OPPOSITION OF PROPOSITION 6: VOTER APPROVAL FOR FUTURE GAS AND VEHICLE TAXES AND 2017 TAX REPEAL INITIATIVE

Dear Colleagues on the City Council and Members of the Public,

Last year, Governor Jerry Brown signed into law Senate Bill 1, to repair streets and roads, improve transit systems, strengthen our transportation infrastructure, and address the overwhelming backlog of needed repairs.

We need the funds from SB1, which provides Oakland millions per year for pothole repair and more - as well as for broader regional needs. There is approximately \$73 billion of unmet funding need for local streets, roads and \$72 billion backlog to the State's highway system.

Proposition 6 would eliminate S.B. 1 funding currently dedicated to fixing roads and potholes, reducing traffic congestion and upgrading freeways, bridges, tunnels and overpasses to make them safer. In addition, losing S.B. 1 will cost the City of Oakland lots of transit, bicycle and pedestrian projects.

It is anticipated that the City of Oakland will receive between \$7-\$9 million dollars per year through S.B. 1 unless the funding is curtailed.

I am therefore submitting this Resolution, to oppose Proposition 6.

RESOLUTION OF THE OAKLAND CITY COUNCIL IN OPPOSITION OF PROPOSITION 6: VOTER APPROVAL FOR FUTURE GAS AND VEHICLE TAXES AND 2017 TAX REPEAL INITIATIVE

WHEREAS, cracked, potholed roads in poor condition pose a major safety threat to California drivers; and

WHEREAS, reliable transportation infrastructure is critical to get Californians to work, move goods and services to the market, and support the economy; and

WHEREAS, there is approximately \$73 billion of unmet funding need for local streets and roads and \$72 billion backlog to the State's highway system; and

WHEREAS, in 2017, California Governor Jerry Brown signed into legislation Senate Bill 1 (S.B. 1) to advance a comprehensive framework to address the overwhelming backlog of streets and roads repair and deferred maintenance as well as other transportation needs; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that the City of Oakland will receive between \$7-\$9 million dollars per year through S.B. 1 unless the funding is curtailed; and

WHEREAS, Proposition 6 will eliminate S.B. 1 funding currently dedicated to fixing roads and potholes, reducing traffic congestion and upgrading freeways, bridges, tunnels and overpasses to make them safer. In addition, losing S.B. 1 will cost the City of Oakland lots of transit, bicycle and pedestrian projects; and

WHEREAS, eliminating the funding would cost drivers and taxpayers more money in the long-run by delaying or stopping much needed maintenance and repairs; and

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland (2017) has a Pavement Condition Index rating of 55 out of 100 (at risk), with many streets slumping into the sub-50 (poor) category; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That the Oakland City Council opposes Proposition 6 on the November 6, 2018 statewide ballot.
