RECOMMENDATION

Staff Recommends That The City Council Adopt A Resolution Authorizing The City Administrator To Enter Into Grant Agreements With Eight (8) Oakland-based Nonprofit Organizations Providing Arts And Cultural Services In Oakland, As Part Of The Pilot Grant Program "Neighborhood Voices: Belonging In Oakland," During Fiscal Year 2018-19, In A Total Amount Not To Exceed \$80,000.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Adoption of the proposed resolution will authorize the City Administrator to enter into eight (8) Cultural Services Grant Agreements with eight (8) Oakland-based nonprofit organizations who will partner with a collaborating organization to provide cultural services in Oakland. These organizations and artists support artistic excellence and cultural diversity through the provision of services in dance, music, theater, media, digital, visual, literary, and community arts, while leveraging other government, corporate, and private spending on the arts in Oakland.

The Funding Advisory Committee (FAC) met on March 6, 2019 to review the recommendations of the Funding Review Panels. The FAC voted unanimously to recommend that the City Council award the proposed grants, totaling \$80,000 using funds from the General Fund balance for Fiscal Year (FY) 2018-2019. A complete list of FY2018-19 Round Two Grant Applicants and Recommended Awards can be found in Attachment A.

For FY2018-19, the Cultural Funding program will award Cultural Service grants in two separate rounds. On September 17, 2018, City Council approved the Round One awards in a total of \$1,136,253.64 to 69 Oakland-based individual artists and nonprofit organizations. This report details the request to award the applications that were submitted for the Round Two FY2018-19 January 27, 2019 deadline.

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BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

Program Overview

The Cultural Funding Program (CFP) is an annual program established by City Council in 1985 as the City's mechanism to support Oakland-based nonprofit arts and cultural organizations through a competitive application process. These grants infuse Oakland's neighborhoods with arts and cultural activities that increase exposure to, understanding of, and respect for diverse cultural heritages; support arts activities that engage the community; and support hands-on arts instruction in Oakland's public schools. The program has provided funding in six categories:

- Individual Artist Project;
- Organization Project;
- Art-in-Schools Project;
- Neighborhood Voices;
- Strategic Development for Emerging Organizations; and
- Organizational Assistance

Policies, review procedures, and a panel system of evaluating applications were established to ensure transparency and public trust in the distribution of public funds for the arts in Oakland. Oakland's CFP is one of the only local, grant-making agencies that allow the applicants to address the panel during a three-minute period. The applicant's three-minute address is used to clarify any questions or misinterpretations that the applicant may have heard during the panel discussion. The program is managed by Cultural Affairs staff within the Department of Economic & Workforce Development. The Funding Advisory Committee (FAC) reviews scores established by the panels, makes allocation recommendations based on panel ranking, and hears applicant appeals, if any. The FAC is a volunteer body providing input in matters relating to CFP policies and procedures. The seven voting members are recruited from the arts community, and are elected by current FAC members.

With Council support, CFP grants have historically been funded from the General-Purpose Fund (GPF). In FY 2009-10, voters passed Measure C, adding a Transient Occupancy Tax (TOT) surcharge that supplements CFP funding, with a commensurate budgeted reduction in GPF support for the grants program.

ANALYSIS AND POLICY ALTERNATIVES

Neighborhood Voices: Belong in Oakland (VOICES) is a pilot grant program seeking to lift up seldom-heard voices of Oakland's neighborhoods by supporting the expression, recognition, and understanding of the array of diverse communities that make Oakland unique, vibrant, and resilient. This program is part of the launch of <u>Belonging in Oakland</u>, the City of Oakland's new cultural development plan that aims to promote cultural equity, belonging, and well-being for all the communities of Oakland.

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VOICES was designed to highlight and support community-based cultural expressions, stories, histories, and heritage of the many communities in Oakland's neighborhoods—particularly ones that historically have not received equitable investments of resources or recognition.

Applications were encouraged from the following:

- Cultural groups that have received little or no support from the City of Oakland;
- Racial/ethnic-specific communities or other types of communities that are underrecognized or lack visibility in Oakland generally;
- Neighborhoods with few formal cultural resources (such as, cultural centers, performance venues, art galleries, cultural education programs, etc.);
- Partners who are deeply grounded and engaged in the neighborhood where the project is based

On February 13, 2019, a selected committee of panel reviewers met to discuss, score and rank 27 proposals from applicants for the VOICES grant. Panelists thoroughly discussed, evaluated and scored each proposal based on established criteria. In broad terms, the criteria for panel review are: (1) soundness of applicant's plan for artistic/cultural services and quality of the artistic product; (2) management ability of personnel and the fiscal soundness of the program or project; (3) the applicant's ability to implement the proposed activities; identify and market services to potential audiences; and (4) the extent to which the applicant's activities fulfill the goals of the CFP. Upon completion of the review process and ranking of the applications, the FAC was charged with determining a cut-off for grant awards and the allocation of funds. Applicants receiving an average score lower than 70 (from a possible 100 points) were automatically disqualified for funding. A score of 70 or below indicates that the application met the evaluation criteria marginally or needs improvement.

At a public meeting on March 6, 2019, the FAC determined grant awards based on applicant ranking by score and funds available, and voted unanimously to recommend the City Council award a total of eight grants to eight artists and organizations. The eight grants recommended in FY 2018-19 will support projects that will serve six (6) council districts and involve collaborations between 16 Oakland-based organizations.

A total of 76 Events/Activities will be funded by the CFP through the VOICES grant category. Of the 76 Events/Activities funded, 67 will be offered free to the public. Approximately 18,759 participants will be exposed to arts programming and activities through these funded events activities and projects. This figure includes participants and audiences. Of the participants exposed to funded art experiences, an estimated 92% will be Oakland-based, and 874 will be directly engaged in the funded activities and projects. A complete list of descriptions for recommended projects can be found in **Attachment B.**

FISCAL IMPACT

Fiscal Year 2018-19 funds for the Cultural Funding Program are budgeted as follows: \$80,000 in General Purpose Fund (1010), CCAD-Cultural Programs Org (90523), Project (1000166).

PUBLIC OUTREACH / INTEREST

How-to-Apply Workshops were held at City Hall and at East Oakland Youth Development Center. Representatives from over 40 non-profit and grassroots social service, arts, and education organizations attended the workshops.

An Open Call invited community members to serve on a peer review panel. A panel convened to discuss and evaluate applications in an open meeting, where applicants had the opportunity to attend and address the panel with a three-minute statement. The panel review meeting was open to the public and held February 13, 2019 in City Hall, Hearing Room 3.

COORDINATION

The City Attorney's Office and the Budget Bureau have been consulted in the preparation of this report and resolution. The FAC has also been consulted, and made the award recommendations herein presented to the City Council

SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

Economic: Community-oriented arts activities bolster the cultural arts identity of Oakland, fortifying the City as a destination, and creating positive publicity resulting in varying levels of economic return. The Oakland Cultural Funding grantees employ over 650 cultural workers and support staff. Their activities generate local sales taxes and revenues for city and local businesses. Many Oakland grantee organizations have received international notoriety and draw large crowds for their performances or art work.

Environmental: There are no environmental opportunities or benefits resulting from any action outlined in this report.

Social Equity: The Cultural Funding Program offers an open, competitive process for applicants, resulting in awards to artists and arts organizations that represent all seven Council districts. Social equity is achieved through outreach activities that include How-to-Apply Workshops, one-on-one technical assistance provided by Cultural Funding Program staff, and the recruitment of review panelists that represent Oakland's diverse community. The Cultural

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Funding program provided additional support to artists and organizations that serve low-income, culturally-specific, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer (LGBTQ), youth, and senior communities.

ACTION REQUESTED OF THE CITY COUNCIL

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR TO ENTER INTO EIGHT GRANT AGREEMENTS WITH EIGHT OAKLAND-BASED NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS PROVIDING ARTS AND CULTURAL SERVICES IN OAKLAND, AS PART OF THE PILOT GRANT PROGRAM "NEIGHBORHOOD VOICES: BELONGING IN OAKLAND," DURING FISCAL YEAR 2018-19, IN A TOTAL AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$80,000.

WHEREAS, in 1985, City Council adopted the first arts funding policies and procedures for the City of Oakland, establishing a panel system of evaluating funding proposals and distributing City funds to the arts; and

WHEREAS, the Cultural Funding Program is the City's funding mechanism to support Oakland-based nonprofit organizations and artists providing arts and cultural activities to the public; and

WHEREAS, the mission of the Cultural Funding Program is to fund Oakland-based art and cultural activities that reflect the diversity of the City for citizens of and visitors to Oakland, focusing on the key areas of General Support, Neighborhood Arts, and Arts Education, through four, core grant making categories for Individual Artist Projects, Organization Projects, Organizational Assistance, and Art in the Schools; and

WHEREAS, the Cultural Funding Program established two grant rounds for FY18-19, and on September 17, 2019 the City Council approved the grant awards for round one of the FY18-19, this resolution outlines the grant allocations for Round Two; and

WHEREAS, on February 13, 2019, a review panel convened and forwarded recommendations to award grants to eight (8) organizations proposing to provide arts and cultural programming to the citizens of Oakland; and

WHEREAS, Fiscal Year 2018-19 funds for the Cultural Funding Program are budgeted in General Purpose Fund (1010), CCAD-Cultural Programs Org (90523), Cultural Arts Grant Fund Project (1000166); and

WHEREAS, on March 6, 2019 the City of Oakland Funding Advisory Committee met to review the final grant recommendations for all categories, and voted unanimously to recommend to City Council that these grants be funded in the amounts listed herein; and

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland Funding Advisory Committee recommends specific funding to nonprofit organizations as follows; now, therefore, be it
