Importance Of The 2020 U.S. Census

Colleagues on the City Council and Members of the Public,

The Census is a critical component of democracy and helps to ensure fair representation. It is the basis for determining representation at the local, state, and national levels. Census data determines the number of U.S. representatives each state sends to Congress and sets the district boundaries for congressional, state senator, assembly member, county supervisor, and city council elections.

Census participation impacts the programs and services we can offer in our own community because the federal government uses the census count to determine how to allocate \$675 billion per year in funding to state and local governments. That money goes toward critical programs that support education, housing, health and transportation and other services. California could lose up to \$1,000 in federal funds for each person not counted in Census 2020, for each of the next 10 years, according to the most recent analysis from George Washington University's study titled Counting for Dollars 2020. Census data is used to make other important decisions in our community:

- Transportation planners use census data to decide on public transit routes.
- Community organizations rely on census data to identify community needs, request and fund programs, monitor trends and assess program effectiveness.
- Residents use census data to support community initiatives involving legislation, qualityof-life and consumer advocacy.
- Businesses rely on census data to decide where to open facilities and what types of services/products to provide.

The recent aggressive tactics of U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement coupled with the President's attempt to add a question regarding citizenship to the census questionnaire understandably may have caused fear among our immigrant residents about participating in the

2020 Census. It is important to understand that the in June 2019, the U.S. Supreme Court blocked the citizenship question from being added to the 2020 Census. Furthermore, federal law protects census responses. Answers can only be used to produce statistics and cannot be shared with immigration enforcement or law enforcement agencies and cannot be used to determine eligibility for government benefits.

## Everyone counts.

The census counts every person living in the U.S. once, only once, and in the right place.



# It's about fair representation.

Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion the House of Representatives, determining how many seats each state gets.





### It's in the Constitution.


The U.S. Constitution requires a census every 10 years. The census covers the entire country and everyone living here. The first census was in 1790.




### Your data are confidential.

Federal law protects your census responses. Your answers can only be used to produce statistics.


By law we cannot share your information with immigration enforcement agencies, law enforcement agencies, or allow it to be used to determine your eligibility for government benefits.

INTRODUCED BY MAYOR LIBBY SCHAAF A	

RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF THE 2020 U.S. CENSUS AND ENCOURAGING ALL RESIDENTS TO PARTICIPATE IN THE CENSUS TO ENSURE AN ACCURATE COUNT FOR THE CITY OF OAKLAND

**WHEREAS**, the U.S. Census Bureau is required by Article I, Section 2 of the U.S. Constitution to conduct an accurate count of the population every ten years; and

**WHEREAS,** the next enumeration will be held on April 1, 2020, and will be the first Census to rely heavily on online responses; and

**WHEREAS**, the primary and perpetual challenge facing the U.S. Census Bureau is the undercount of certain population groups; and

**WHEREAS,** that challenge is amplified in California, given the size of the state and the diversity of communities; and

**WHEREAS**, California, the County of Alameda and the City of Oakland each has a large percentage of individuals that are considered traditionally hard to count; and

**WHEREAS**, these diverse communities and demographic populations are at risk of being missed in the 2020 Census; and

WHEREAS, the census count impacts how congressional seats are apportioned, how state and federal dollars are distributed, where businesses choose to invest; and

**WHEREAS**, California receives nearly \$77 billion in federal funding that relies, in part, on census data; and

WHEREAS, Oakland receives millions in federal funding that relies, in part, on census data; and

- WHEREAS, a complete and accurate count is essential to maintaining and improving services for Oakland residents; and
- **WHEREAS,** the data is also used in the redistricting of state legislatures, county boards of supervisors and city councils; and
- WHEREAS, the decennial census is a massive undertaking that requires crosssector collaboration and partnership in order to achieve a complete and accurate count; and
- WHEREAS, California's leaders have dedicated a historic amount of funding and resources to ensure every Californian is counted once, only once and in the right place; and
- **WHEREAS,** Census activities require coordination between tribal, city, county, state governments, community-based organizations, education, and many other stakeholders; and
- WHEREAS, the U.S. Census Bureau is facing several challenges with Census 2020, including constrained fiscal environment, rapidly changing use of technology, declining response rates, increasingly diverse and mobile population; and
- WHEREAS, regardless of citizenship status, all Oakland residents should participate in the Census without fear of retribution as personal information collected through the Census is protected under Title 13 of the United States Code and therefore, cannot be shared with any federal, state or local law enforcement and government agencies, nor can it be used to determine eligibility for government benefits; and
- **WHEREAS,** the City of Oakland in partnership with the County of Alameda and other local governments, the State, businesses, schools, and community organizations, is committed to robust outreach and communication strategies, focusing on reaching the hardest-to-count individuals; now, therefore, be it

**RESOLVED**: That the City of Oakland recognizes the importance of the 2020 U.S. Census and supports outreach to help ensure a complete, fair, and accurate count of all Californians; and be it

**FURTHER RESOLVED:** That the City of Oakland encourages all residents to participate in the 2020 U.S. Census to ensure an accurate count for the City, region and the State of California.
