RECOMMENDATION

Staff Recommends That City Council Adopt A Resolution Authorizing The City Administrator, Or Her Designee To:

- 1) Accept And Appropriate Federal Fiscal Year 2019 Urban Area Security Initiative (FY 2019 UASI) Grant Funds From The City and County Of San Francisco In An Amount Of Up To One Million Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$1,050,000.00);
- (2) Approving The FY 2019 UASI Recommended Grant Spending Plan;
- (3) Waiving The City's Advertising And Competitive Bidding And Purchasing Requirements For Procurement Of Equipment When Required By The FY 2019 UASI Grant;
- (4) Authorizing The City Administrator Or Designee To Expend Said Grant Funds In Accordance With the Recommended Spending Plan Provided The City's Hiring And Contracting Requirements And Programs / Policies Are Followed; And
- (5) Accepting And Appropriating Additional FY 2019 UASI Grant Funds In An Amount Not To Exceed Fifty Percent (50%) Of The Original Grant Award.
- (6) Authorizing Use Of the General Purpose Fund To Cover The Cost Of Central Service Overhead Charges Affiliated With Said Grant.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Passage of this Resolution will authorize the City Administrator, or her designee, to enter into a grant administration agreement with the City and County of San Francisco for one million fifty thousand dollars (1,050,000.00) for FY 2019, to accept, administer, appropriate and expend the FY 2019 UASI funding for this grant year as per the Grant award/agreement and recommended spending plan, and to waive the City advertising and competitive bidding and purchasing requirements for procurement of equipment when required by the grant funds. The grant agreement includes the mandatory processes for requests for reimbursement of the approved

salaries and benefits, contracts, and purchases. The term of this Agreement shall commence on November 1, 2019 and shall end on May 31, 2021.

BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security, Office for Domestic Preparedness (ODP) Urban Area Securities Initiative (UASI) was born from the events of 9/11 and from the approval of the National Strategy for Homeland Security (NSHS) by President George W. Bush in 2002 (DHS, 2003). The first year of implementation for UASI funding awards began in 2003, and allocations were awarded to seven urban areas that were considered the highest risk urban areas in the United States.

The first UASI grant awarded in 2003 incorporated the following seven high-risk urban areas: San Francisco, CA (henceforth, referred to as the Bay Area, and included Oakland); the Los Angeles/Long Beach, CA area; the National Capital area (Washington, DC); New York City, including the boroughs Manhattan, the Bronx, Queens, and Brooklyn, NY; Chicago, IL; Houston, TX; and Seattle, WA.

The Bay Area UASI now encompasses twelve (12) counties, three (3) major cities, over one hundred (100) municipalities for a combined total population exceeding 8.2 million people.

The purpose of the UASI Programs is to provide financial assistance towards the planning, organizing, equipping and training and exercise needs of large urban areas, and to assist them in building an enhanced and sustainable capacity to protect, prevent, mitigate, respond and recover from threats or acts of terrorism in alignment of the five (5) mission areas of the National Preparedness Goal.

The City of Oakland Fiscal Year (FY) 2019 UASI grant proposal was approved by the Bay Area Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) Approval Authority and the City of Oakland has been awarded a grant allocation of up to one million fifty thousand dollars (1,050,000.00), for FY 2019 as part of an investment to the region.

ANALYSIS AND POLICY ALTERNATIVES

The following program/project initiatives have been authorized and approved by the United States Department of Homeland Security, the California Office of Homeland Security and the Bay Area UASI Approval Authority:

- (1) Up to five (5) Full Time / Part Time Staff Positions:
 - Critical Infrastructure
 - This Planning Coordinator will coordinate and participate in activities relative to the Critical Infrastructure relative to support a terrorist attack.

 Deliverables will include select training and exercise events as described in Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP), as well as the development of a concept of Operations (ConOps) document.

Cybersecurity

- This Planning Coordinator will coordinate and participate in activities relative to the Critical Infrastructure relative to support a terrorist attack. Deliverables will include select training and exercise events as described in HSEEP, as well as the development of a Concept of Operations (ConOps) document.
- Public Safety Information Sharing
- This Planning Coordinator will collaborate with local jurisdiction in determining the needs across Alameda County, adjacent counties and other Bay Area Core Cities, in the event a terrorist attack requires resources beyond what the City of Oakland is capable of providing. Deliverables will include a Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) Report.
- Emergency Planning and Community Preparedness
- This Planning Coordinator will locate resources, develop processes and procedures and organize donations beyond government entities. Research and establishment of a robust and easily searchable database system and integration of this resource into the Emergency Response Organization.
- Catastrophic Planning and Response
- This Planning Coordinator will establish manage and coordinate all phases of terrorist event throughout the region and across operational areas. Deliverables include an updated Emergency Operations Plan (EOP), establishing clear protocols, processes and procedures for the Operational Coordination of the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) and ICS/EOC Interface.
- (2) Critical Infrastructure and Key Resources
 - Project Title: Handheld high-pressure mass spectrometry chemical detection system that will help the team's capabilities with gas and vapor chemical detection.
 - This project supports
- (3) Enhance Multi-Jurisdictional All Hazards Incident Planning, Response, and Recovery Capabilities:
 - Project Title: Operational Communication: Infrastructure Enhancement and Support
 - This project will purchase equipment to support critical communications and data systems coordination and resource allocation tools such as WebEOC, satellite communications and public alert and warning systems or notifications to affected members of the community in order to save lives and property.

UASI's FY 2019 grant requirements provide that certain equipment on the spending plan must be purchased from federal government schedules. Therefore, staff is recommending that the City Administrator, or her designee be authorized to make all purchases and enter into contracts

identified on the FY 2019 UASI spending plan as identified in the report, without further review or action by the City Council. Consistent with Oakland Municipal Code Section 2.04.050.1.5, City staff recommends that the City Council waive the City's advertising, bidding and purchasing requirements for purchases of equipment from federal spending schedules when required by the FY 2019 UASI grant to ensure Oakland has the resources necessary to close an identified capability gap in our emergency preparedness.

Approval of this Resolution will authorize the acceptance and appropriation of FY2019 UASI grant funds.

FISCAL IMPACT

FY2019 UASI grant funds will be deposited in the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Fund (2123); Emergency Services Program (20711); Project (TBD); Office of Emergency Services/Homeland Security (PS21).

PUBLIC OUTREACH / INTEREST

Those within the Bay Area UASI region are welcomed to participate in the UASI Grant planning process. Representatives from member jurisdictions organize in the East, West, North and

South Bay Hubs to review grant proposals. The membership reviews, vets and prioritizes the proposed projects. Final recommendations for funding are then sent to the UASI Approval Authority for final approvals. UASI Approval Authority Meeting dates are posted on the Bay Area UASI website; http://www.bayareauasi.org/events-calendar.

The Bay Area UASI produces three newsletters and an annual report each year to highlight the activities of the organization.

COORDINATION

The FY 2019 UASI grant application processes involved numerous meetings with hundreds of participants throughout the region, in which representatives from the City of Oakland Police Department, Fire Department and the Emergency Management Services Division regularly attend. OFD's Emergency Services Division consulted with the Budget Bureau and City Attorney in the preparation of both the grant application and this agenda report. This coordination process ensures that the projects funded are integrated throughout the Bay Area UASI Region.

SUSTAINABLE OPPORTUNITIES

Economic: In keeping with the mission areas of the National Preparedness goal to: protect, prevent, mitigate, respond and recover; preparation of efforts in keeping the City of Oakland safe and secure supports the Bay Area as a desirable place to live, work and play; and continually encouraging and attracting visitors from around the globe, that spend \$16.6 million dollars daily throughout the region.

Environmental: Emergency management programs proactively approach the rising risks and threats that are a result of climate change. With preemptive research and planning, the effects that disasters can have on general health of the ecosystem – which may be affected by decisions and prioritization of actions taken in the pursuit of long-term recovery, can be mitigated. Through collaboration, these systems and the organizations and communities that surround them can thrive in the aftermath of disaster to become more environmentally sustainable and physically survivable.

Race and Equity: Collaboration and coordination across all levels of government, the private sector, special districts, non-governmental organizations, and everyday people, presents the opportunity for overcoming challenges that affect marginalized populations; not limited to the non-English speaking, persons with access and functional needs and the economically disadvantaged. Emergency management practices encourage a holistic approach for incorporating ideas of sustainability, resilience and social equity.

ACTION REQUESTED OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Staff Recommends that City Council adopt a resolution authorizing the City Administrator, or designee, to:

- 1) accept and appropriate federal fiscal year 2019 Urban Area Security Initiative (FY 2019 UASI) grant funds from the City and County of San Francisco in an amount of up to one million fifty thousand dollars (\$1,050,000.00);
- 2) approve the FY 2019 UASI recommended grant spending plan:
- 3) waive the City's advertising and competitive bidding and purchasing requirements for procurement of equipment when required by the FY 2019 UASI grant;
- 4) authorizing the City Administrator or Designee to expend said grant funds in accordance with the recommended spending plan provided the City's hiring and contracting requirements and programs / policies are followed; and
- (5) accepting and appropriating additional FY 2019 UASI grant funds in an amount not to exceed fifty percent (50%) of the original grant award.
- (6) Authorizing use of the general-purpose fund to cover the cost of central service overhead charges affiliated with said grant.

A. Agreement Between the City and County of San Francisco and the City of Oakland for the Distribution of FY 2019 UASI Grant Funds

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO AND THE CITY OF OAKLAND FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF FY 2019 UASI GRANT FUNDS

THIS AGREEMENT is made this **NOVEMBER 1, 2019** in the City and County of San Francisco, State of California, by and between the **CITY OF OAKLAND** ("OAKLAND") and the CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO, a municipal corporation ("San Francisco" or "City"), in its capacity as fiscal agent for the Approval Authority, as defined below, acting by and through the San Francisco Department of Emergency Management ("DEM").

RECITALS

WHEREAS, The United States Department of Homeland Security ("DHS") consolidated the separate San Jose, Oakland, and San Francisco Urban Areas into a combined Bay Area Urban Area ("UASI Region") for the purpose of application for and allocation and distribution of federal Urban Areas Security Initiative ("UASI") program grant funds; and

WHEREAS, The Bay Area Urban Area Approval Authority ("Approval Authority") was established as the Urban Area Working Group ("UAWG") for the UASI Region, to provide overall governance of the homeland security grant program across the UASI Region, to coordinate development and implementation of all UASI program initiatives, and to ensure compliance with all UASI program requirements; and

WHEREAS, The UASI General Manager is responsible for implementing and managing the policy and program decisions of the Approval Authority, directing the work of the UASI Management Team personnel, and performing other duties as determined and directed by the Approval Authority, and

WHEREAS, San Francisco has been designated as the grantee for UASI funds granted by the DHS through the California Office of Emergency Services ("Cal OES") to the UASI Region, with responsibility to establish procedures and execute subgrant agreements for the distribution of UASI program grant funds to jurisdictions selected by the Approval Authority to receive grant funding; and

WHEREAS, San Francisco has been designated to serve as the fiscal agent for the Approval Authority, and to establish procedures and provide all financial services for distribution of UASI program grant funds within the UASI Region; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to grant allocation decisions by the Approval Authority, the UASI Management Team has asked San Francisco to distribute a portion of the regional UASI grant funds to OAKLAND on the terms and conditions set forth herein;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and the mutual covenants contained in this Agreement and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1 DEFINITIONS

- 1.1 <u>Specific Terms</u>. Unless the context requires otherwise, the following capitalized terms (whether singular or plural) shall have the meanings set forth below:
- (a) "ADA" shall mean the Americans with Disabilities Act (including all rules and regulations there under) and all other applicable federal, state and local disability rights legislation, as the same may be amended, modified or supplemented from time to time.
- (b) "<u>Authorized Expenditures</u>" shall mean expenditures for those purposes identified and budgeted in Appendix A, attached hereto and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.
 - (c) "Event of Default" shall have the meaning set forth in Section 7.1.
- (d) "<u>Fiscal Quarter</u>" shall mean each period of three calendar months commencing on July 1, October 1, January 1, and April 1, respectively.
- (e) "Grant Funds" shall mean any and all funds allocated or disbursed to OAKLAND (DUNS#: 603919432) under this Agreement. This Agreement shall specifically cover funds allocated or disbursed from Cal OES Grant No. 2019-0035, Cal OES ID No. 075-95017, CFDA No. 97.067, per Cal OES award notice dated September 26, 2019.
- (f) "Grant Plan" shall mean the plans, performances, events, exhibitions, acquisitions or other activities or matter, and the budget and requirements, described in Appendix A and the WebGrants system. If OAKLAND requests any modification to the Grant Plan, OAKLAND shall submit a written request to the UASI General Manager with the following information: Scope of change requested, reason for change, proposed plan for change, summary of approved and requested modifications to the Grant Plan, and any necessary approvals in support of change (e.g., EHP).
- (g) "Indemnified Parties" shall mean: (i) San Francisco, including all commissions, departments including DEM, agencies, and other subdivisions of San Francisco; (ii) San Francisco's elected officials, directors, officers, employees, agents, successors, and assigns; and (iii) all persons or entities acting on behalf of the foregoing.
- (h) "Losses" shall mean any and all liabilities, obligations, losses, damages, penalties, claims, actions, suits, judgments, fees, expenses and costs of whatsoever kind and nature (including legal fees and expenses and costs of investigation, of prosecuting or defending any Loss described above) whether or not such Loss be founded or unfounded, of whatsoever kind and nature.
 - (i) "Reimbursement Request" shall have the meaning set forth in Section 3.10(a).
- Additional Terms. The terms "as directed," "as required" or "as permitted" and similar terms shall refer to the direction, requirement, or permission of City. The terms "sufficient," "necessary" or "proper" and similar terms shall mean sufficient, necessary or proper in the sole judgment of City. The terms "approval," "acceptable" or "satisfactory" or similar terms shall mean approved by, or acceptable or satisfactory to, City. The terms "include," "included" or "including" and similar terms shall be deemed to be followed by the words "without limitation." The use of the term "subcontractor," "subgrantee," "successor" or "assign" herein refers only to a subcontractor, subgrantee, successor or assign expressly permitted under Article 8.

- 1.3 <u>References to this Agreement</u>. References to this Agreement include: (a) any and all appendices, exhibits, schedules, and attachments hereto; (b) any and all statutes, ordinances, regulations or other documents expressly incorporated by reference herein; and (c) any and all amendments, modifications or supplements hereto made in accordance with Section 10.2. References to articles, sections, subsections or appendices refer to articles, sections or subsections of or appendices to this Agreement, unless otherwise expressly stated. Terms such as "hereunder," "herein" or "hereto" refer to this Agreement as a whole.
- 1.4 <u>Reference to laws</u>. Any reference in this Agreement to a federal or state statute, regulation, executive order, requirement, policy, guide, guideline, information bulletin, or instruction shall mean that statute, regulation, executive order, requirement, policy, guide, guideline, information bulletin, or instruction as is currently in effect and as may be amended, modified or supplemented from time to time.

ARTICLE 2 ALLOCATION AND CERTIFICATION OF GRANT FUNDS; LIMITATIONS ON SAN FRANCISCO'S OBLIGATIONS

- Risk of Non-Allocation of Grant Funds. This Agreement is subject to all federal and state grant requirements and guidelines, including DHS and Cal OES requirements, guidelines, information bulletins, and instructions, the decision-making of the Cal OES and the Approval Authority, the terms and conditions of the grant award; the approved application, and to the extent applicable the budget and fiscal provisions of the San Francisco Charter. The Approval Authority shall have no obligation to allocate or direct disbursement of funds for this Agreement in lieu of allocations for new or other agreements.

 OAKLAND acknowledges and agrees that grant decisions are subject to the discretion of the Cal OES and Approval Authority. Further, OAKLAND acknowledges and agrees that the City shall have no obligation to disburse grant funds to OAKLAND until City and OAKLAND have fully and finally executed this Agreement. OAKLAND acknowledges and agrees that if it takes any action, informal or formal, to appropriate, encumber or expend Grant Funds before final allocation decisions by Cal OES and the Approval Authority, and before this Agreement is fully and finally executed, it assumes all risk of possible non-allocation or non-reimbursement of funds, and such acknowledgement and agreement is part of the consideration of this Agreement.
- 2.2 <u>Certification of Controller: Guaranteed Maximum Costs.</u> No funds shall be available under this Agreement without prior written authorization certified by the San Francisco Controller. In addition, as set forth in Section 21.19 of the San Francisco Administrative Code:
- (a) San Francisco's obligations hereunder shall not at any time exceed the amount approved in the grant award and/or by the Approval Authority, and certified by the Controller for the purpose and period stated in such certification.
- (b) Except as may be provided by San Francisco ordinances governing emergency conditions, San Francisco and its employees and officers, and the UASI Management Team and its personnel, are not authorized to request OAKLAND to perform services or to provide materials, equipment and supplies that would result in OAKLAND performing services or providing materials, equipment and supplies that are beyond the scope of the services, materials, equipment and supplies specified in this Agreement, unless this Agreement is amended in writing and approved as required by law to authorize the additional services, materials, equipment or supplies. San Francisco is not required to pay OAKLAND for services, materials, equipment or supplies that are provided by OAKLAND that are beyond the scope of the services, materials, equipment and supplies agreed upon herein and which were not approved by a written amendment to this Agreement having been lawfully executed by San Francisco.

- (c) San Francisco and its employees and officers, and the UASI Management Team and its personnel, are not authorized to offer or promise to OAKLAND additional funding for this Agreement that would exceed the maximum amount of funding provided for herein. Additional funding for this Agreement in excess of the maximum provided herein shall require lawful approval and certification by the Controller. San Francisco is not required to honor any offered or promised additional funding that exceeds the maximum provided in this Agreement that requires lawful approval and certification of the Controller when the lawful approval and certification by the Controller has not been obtained.
- (d) The Controller is not authorized to make payments on any agreement for which funds have not been certified as available in the budget or by supplemental appropriation.
- 2.3 <u>SUPERSEDURE OF CONFLICTING PROVISIONS</u>. IN THE EVENT OF ANY CONFLICT BETWEEN ANY OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ARTICLE 2 AND ANY OTHER PROVISION OF THIS AGREEMENT, THE APPLICATION DOCUMENTS OR ANY OTHER DOCUMENT OR COMMUNICATION RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, THE TERMS OF THIS ARTICLE 2 SHALL GOVERN.

ARTICLE 3 PERFORMANCE OF THE AGREEMENT

- 3.1 <u>Duration of Term.</u> The term of this Agreement shall commence on <u>NOVEMBER 1, 2019</u> and shall end at 11:59 p.m. San Francisco time on <u>DECEMBER 31, 2020</u>.
- 3.2 <u>Maximum Amount of Funds</u>. In no event shall the amount of Grant Funds disbursed hereunder exceed **ONE MILLION FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS** (\$1,050,000). The City will not automatically transfer Grant Funds to OAKLAND upon execution of this Agreement. OAKLAND must submit a Reimbursement Request under Section 3.10 of this Agreement, approved by the UASI Management Team and City, before the City will disburse Grant Funds to OAKLAND.

3.3 Use of Funds.

- (a) General Requirements. OAKLAND shall use the Grant Funds received under this Agreement for the purposes and in the amounts set forth in the Grant Plan. OAKLAND shall not use or expend Grant Funds for any other purpose, including but not limited to, for matching funds for other federal grants/cooperative agreements, lobbying or intervention in federal regulatory or adjudicatory proceedings, or to sue the federal government or any other government entity. OAKLAND shall not permit any federal employee to receive Grant Funds.
- (b) Modification of Grant Plan. Under Sections 1.1(f) and 10.2 of this Agreement, OAKLAND may submit a written request to modify the Grant Plan. OAKLAND shall not appropriate, encumber or expend any additional or reallocated Grant Funds pursuant to such a request for modification until (1) the General Manager or designee has provided written approval for the request and (2) the parties have finally executed a modification of this Agreement under Section 10.2, to reflect the modified Grant Plan. In addition, if the modification request requires approval from the Approval Authority and/or Cal OES, as determined by the General Manager, OAKLAND shall not appropriate, encumber or expend any additional or reallocated Grant Funds pursuant to the modification request without approval from the Approval Authority and/or Cal OES.
- (c) No Supplanting. OAKLAND shall use Grant Funds to supplement existing funds, and not replace (supplant) funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose.

(d) Obligations. OAKLAND must expend Grant Funds in a timely manner consistent with the grant milestones, guidance and assurances; and make satisfactory progress toward the goals, objectives, milestones and deliverables in this Agreement.

3.4 Grant Assurances; Other Requirements; Cooperation with Monitoring.

- (a) OAKLAND shall comply with all Grant Assurances included in Appendix B, attached hereto and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein. OAKLAND shall require all subgrantees, contractors and other entities receiving Grant Funds through or from OAKLAND to execute a copy of the Grant Assurances, and shall ensure that they comply with those Grant Assurances.
- (b) In addition to complying with all Grant Assurances, OAKLAND shall comply with all applicable statutes, regulations, executive orders, requirements, policies, guides, guidelines, information bulletins, Cal OES grant management memos, and instructions; the terms and conditions of the grant award; the approved application, and any conditions imposed by Cal OES or the Approval Authority. OAKLAND shall require and ensure that all subgrantees, contractors and other entities receiving Grant Funds through or from OAKLAND comply with all applicable statutes, regulations, executive orders, requirements, policies, guides, guidelines, information bulletins, Cal OES grant management memos, and instructions; the terms and conditions of the grant award; the approved application, and any conditions imposed by Cal OES or the Approval Authority.
- (c) OAKLAND shall promptly comply with all standards, specifications and formats of San Francisco and the UASI Management Team, as they may from time to time exist, related to evaluation, planning and monitoring of the Grant Plan and compliance with this Agreement. OAKLAND shall cooperate in good faith with San Francisco and the UASI Management Team in any evaluation, inspection, planning or monitoring activities conducted or authorized by DHS, Cal OES, San Francisco or the UASI Management Team. For ensuring compliance with non-supplanting requirements, upon request by City or the UASI Management Team, OAKLAND shall supply documentation certifying that a reduction of non-federal resources occurred for reasons other than the receipt or expected receipt of Grant Funds.
- 3.5 <u>Administrative, Programmatic and Financial Management Requirements.</u> OAKLAND shall establish and maintain administrative, programmatic and financial management systems and records in accordance with federal and State of California requirements. This provision requires, at a minimum, that OAKLAND comply with the following non-exclusive list of regulations commonly applicable to DHS grants, as applicable to this Agreement and the Grant Plan:
 - (a) Administrative Requirements:
 - 1. 2 CFR Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (formerly 44 CFR Part 13, OMB Circulars A-21, A-87, A-89, A-102, A-110, A-122, and A-133).
 - (b) Cost Principles:
 - 1. 2 CFR Part 200, Subpart E Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (formerly 44 CFR Part 13, OMB Circulars A-21, A-87, A-89, A-102, A-110, A-122, and A-133);
 - 2. Federal Acquisition Regulations (FAR), Part 31.2 Contract Principles and Procedures, Contracts with Commercial Organizations.
 - (c) Audit Requirements:

1. 2 CFR Part 200 Subpart F - Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (formerly 44 CFR Part 13, OMB Circulars A-21, A-87, A-89, A-102, A-110, A-122, and A-133).

3.6 Technology Requirements.

- (a) National Information Exchange Model ("NIEM"). OAKLAND shall use the latest NIEM specifications and guidelines regarding the use of Extensible Markup Language ("XML") for all awards of Grant Funds.
- (b) Geospatial Guidance. OAKLAND is encouraged to use Geospatial technologies, which can capture, store, analyze, transmit and/or display location-based information (i.e., information linked to a latitude and longitude), and to align any geospacial activities with the guidance available on the Federal Emergency Management Agency ("FEMA") website.
- (c) Criminal Intelligence Systems Operating Policies. Any information technology system funded or supported by Grant Funds shall comply with 28 CFR Part 23, *Criminal Intelligence Systems Operating Policies*, if applicable.
- (d) OAKLAND is encouraged to use the DHS guidance in *Best Practices for Government Use of CCTV: Implementing the Fair Information Practice Principles*, if Grant Funds are used to purchase or install closed circuit television (CCTV) systems or to support operational CCTV systems.

3.7 Procurement Requirements.

- (a) General Requirements. OAKLAND shall follow its own procurement requirements as long as those requirements comply with all applicable federal and State of California statutes, regulations, requirements, policies, guides, guidelines and instructions.
- (b) Specific Purchases. If OAKLAND is using Grant Funds to purchase interoperable communication equipment, OAKLAND shall consult DHS's SAFECOM's coordinated grant guidance, which outlines standards and equipment information to enhance interoperable communication. If OAKLAND is using Grant Funds to acquire critical emergency supplies, prior to expending any Grant Funds, OAKLAND shall submit to the UASI Management Team for approval by Cal OES a viable inventory management plan, an effective distribution strategy, sustainment costs for such an effort, and logistics expertise to avoid situations where funds are wasted because supplies are rendered ineffective due to lack of planning.
- (c) Bond requirement. OAKLAND shall obtain a performance bond for any equipment items over \$250,000 or any vehicle, aircraft or watercraft financed with Grant Funds.

3.8 Subgrantee and Contractor Requirements.

(a) OAKLAND shall ensure and independently verify that any subgrantee, contractor or other entity receiving Grant Funds through or from OAKLAND is not debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in federal assistance programs, under Executive Orders 12549 and 12689, as implemented at 2 CFR Part 3000. OAKLAND shall obtain documentation of eligibility before disbursing Grant Funds to any subgrantee, contractor or other entity. OAKLAND shall maintain documentary proof of this verification in its files. OAKLAND shall establish procedures for the effective use of the "Excluded Parties List System," to assure that it does not provide Grant Funds to excluded parties. OAKLAND shall also establish procedures to provide for effective use and/or

dissemination of the list to assure that its grantees and subgrantees, including contractors, at any tier do not make awards in violation of the non-procurement debarment and suspension common rule.

- (b) OAKLAND shall ensure that any subgrantee, contractor or other entity receiving Grant Funds through or from OAKLAND complies with the requirements of 44 CFR Part 18, New Restrictions on Lobbying; and
- (c) OAKLAND shall ensure that any subgrantee, contractor or other entity receiving Grant Funds through or from OAKLAND complies with the requirements of 2 CFR Part 3001, Requirements for Drug-Free Workplace (Financial Assistance).

3.9 Monitoring Grant Performance.

- (a) City and the UASI Management Team are both authorized to perform periodic monitoring reviews of OAKLAND's performance under this Agreement, to ensure that the Grant Plan goals, objectives, performance requirements, timelines, milestone completion, budgets and other criteria are being met. Programmatic monitoring may include the Regional Federal Preparedness Coordinators, or other federal or state personnel, when appropriate. Monitoring may involve a combination of desk-based reviews and on-site monitoring visits, inspection of records, and verifications of grant activities. These reviews will involve a review and analysis of the financial, programmatic, performance and administrative issues relative to each program and will identify areas where technical assistance and other support may be needed. The reviews may include, but are not limited to:
 - 1. Evaluating eligibility of expenditures;
 - 2. Comparing actual grant activities to those approved by the Approval Authority and specified in the Grant Plan;
 - 3. Ensuring that any advances have been deposited in an interest bearing account and disbursed in accordance with applicable guidelines; and
 - 4. Confirming compliance with: Grant Assurances; information provided on performance reports and payment requests; and needs and threat assessments and strategies.
- (b) OAKLAND is responsible for monitoring and auditing the grant activities of any subgrantee, contractor or other entity receiving Grant Funds through or from OAKLAND. This requirement includes but is not limited to mandatory on-site verification visits.
- (c) If after any monitoring review, the DHS or Cal OES makes findings that require a Corrective Action Plan by OAKLAND, the City shall place a hold on all Reimbursement Requests from OAKLAND until the findings are resolved.
- 3.10 <u>Disbursement Procedures</u>. San Francisco shall disburse Grant Funds to OAKLAND as follows:
- (a) OAKLAND shall submit to the UASI Management Team, in the manner specified for notices pursuant to Article 9, a document ("Reimbursement Request") substantially in the form attached as Appendix C, attached hereto and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein. The UASI Management Team shall serve as the primary contact for OAKLAND regarding any Reimbursement Request.
- (b) The UASI Management Team will review all Reimbursement Requests for compliance with this Agreement and all applicable guidelines and requirements. The UASI Management Team will

return to OAKLAND any Reimbursement Request that is submitted and not approved by the UASI Management Team, with a brief statement of the reason for the rejection of the Reimbursement Request.

- (c) The UASI Management Team will submit any Reimbursement Request that is approved by the UASI Management Team to DEM. City through DEM shall review the Reimbursement Request for compliance with this Agreement and all applicable guidelines and requirements. City shall return to the UASI Management Team any Reimbursement Request that is not approved by City, with a brief explanation of the reason for the rejection of the Reimbursement Request.
- (d) If a rejection relates only to a portion of the expenditures itemized in any Reimbursement Request, City shall have no obligation to disburse any Grant Funds for any other expenditures itemized in such Reimbursement Request unless and until OAKLAND submits a Reimbursement Request that is in all respects acceptable to the UASI Management Team and to City.
- (e) If OAKLAND is not in compliance with any provision of this Agreement, City may withhold disbursement of Grant Funds until OAKLAND has taken corrective action and currently complies with all terms and conditions of the Agreement.
- 3.11 <u>Disallowance</u>. OAKLAND agrees that if it claims or receives reimbursement from City for an expenditure that is later disallowed by the State of California or the federal government, OAKLAND shall promptly refund the disallowed amount to City upon City's written request. At its option, City may offset all or any portion of the disallowed amount against any other payment due to OAKLAND hereunder or under any other Agreement with OAKLAND. Any such offset with respect to a portion of the disallowed amount shall not release OAKLAND from OAKLAND's obligation hereunder to refund the remainder of the disallowed amount.
- 3.12 <u>Sustainability</u>. Grant Funded programs that contain continuing personnel and operating expenses, over and above planning and implementation costs, must be sustained once the Grant Funding ends. If Equipment is purchased with grant funds the equipment must be sustained through the useful life of equipment. By executing this Agreement, OAKLAND acknowledges its responsibility and agrees to sustain continuing programs beyond the Grant Funding period. OAKLAND acknowledges and agrees that this sustainability requirement is a material term of the Agreement.

3.13 EHP Requirements.

Grant Funded projects must comply with the federal Environmental and Historic Preservation ("EHP") program. OAKLAND shall not initiate any project with the potential to impact environmental or historic properties or resources until Cal OES and FEMA have completed EHP reviews and approved the project. Examples of projects that may impact EHP resources include: communications towers, physical security enhancements, new construction, and modifications to buildings, structures and objects that are 50 years old or greater. OAKLAND shall notify the UASI Management Team of any project that may require an EHP review. OAKLAND agrees to provide detailed project information to FEMA, Cal OES and/or the UASI Management Team, to cooperate fully in the review, and to prepare any documents requested for the review. OAKLAND shall comply with all conditions placed on the project as the result of the EHP review, and implement any treatment or mitigation measures deemed necessary to address potential adverse impacts. With prior approval of the UASI Management Team, OAKLAND may use Grant Funds toward the costs of preparing documents and/or implementing treatment or mitigation measures. Any change to the approved project scope of work will require reevaluation for compliance with EHP requirements. If ground disturbing activities occur during project implementation, OAKLAND shall notify the UASI Management Team and ensure monitoring of ground disturbance. If any potential archeological resources are discovered, OAKLAND shall immediately cease

construction in that area and notify the UASI Management Team, which will notify the appropriate State Historic Preservation Office. If OAKLAND is using Grant Funds for a communication tower project, OAKLAND shall complete its Federal Communication Commission ("FCC") EHP process before preparing its Cal OES/FEMA EHP materials, and shall include the FCC EHP materials in the Cal OES/FEMA submission.

- (b) Any construction or other project that OAKLAND initiates without the necessary EHP review and approval will not be eligible for reimbursement. Failure of OAKLAND to meet federal, State, and local EHP requirements, obtain applicable permits, or comply with any conditions that may be placed on the project as the result of FEMA's and/or Cal OES's EHP review will result in the denial of Reimbursement Requests.
- 3.14 <u>National Energy Conservation Policy and Energy Policy Acts.</u> OAKLAND shall comply with the following requirements:
- (a) Grant Funds may not be used in contravention of the Federal buildings performance and reporting requirements of Executive Order 13123, part 3 of Title V of the National Energy Conservation Policy Act (42 USC §8251 et seq.), or Subtitle A of Title I of the Energy Policy Act of 2005; and
- (b) Grant Funds may not be used in contravention of Section 303 of the Energy Policy Act of 1992 (42 USC §13212).
- 3.15 <u>Royalty-Free License</u>. OAKLAND understands and agrees that FEMA reserves a royalty-free, non-exclusive and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish or otherwise use, and authorize others to use, for federal government purposes: (a) the copyright in any work developed using Grant Funds; and (b) any rights of copyright that OAKLAND purchases or acquires using Grant Funds. OAKLAND shall consult with the UASI Management Team and FEMA regarding the allocation of any patent rights that arise from, or are purchased with, Grant Funds.
- 3.16 <u>Publication Statements</u>. OAKLAND shall ensure that all publications created or developed under this Agreement prominently contain the following statement: "This document was prepared under a grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agencies Grant Programs Directorate (FEMA/GPD) within the US Department of Homeland Security. Points of view or opinions expressed in this document are those of the authors and do not necessarily represent the official position or policies of FEMA/GPD or the US Department of Homeland Security."

ARTICLE 4 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS; AUDITS

- 4.1 <u>Regular Reports</u>. OAKLAND shall provide, in a prompt and timely manner, financial, operational and other reports, as requested by the UASI Management Team or by City, in form and substance satisfactory to the UASI Management Team or City. Such reports, including any copies, shall be submitted on recycled paper and printed on double-sided pages, to the maximum extent possible.
- Management Team and City immediately of (a) any Event of Default or event that, with the passage of time, would constitute an Event of Default; (b) any change of circumstances that would cause any of the representations or warranties contained in Article 5 to be false or misleading at any time during the term of this Agreement; and (c) any change of circumstances or events that would cause OAKLAND to be out of compliance with the Grant Assurances in Appendix B.

- 4.3 <u>Books and Records</u>. OAKLAND shall establish and maintain accurate files and records of all aspects of the Grant Plan and the matters funded in whole or in part with Grant Funds. Without limiting the scope of the foregoing, OAKLAND shall establish and maintain accurate financial books and accounting records relating to Authorized Expenditures and to Grant Funds received and expended under this Agreement, together with all invoices, documents, payrolls, time records and other data related to the matters covered by this Agreement, whether funded in whole or in part with Grant Funds. OAKLAND shall maintain all of the files, records, books, invoices, documents, payrolls and other data required to be maintained under this Section in a readily accessible location and condition for a period of not less than three (3) years after expiration of this Agreement or until any final audit by Cal OES has been fully completed, whichever is later.
- Inspection and Audit. OAKLAND shall make available to the UASI Management Team and to City, and to UASI Management Team and City employees and authorized representatives, during regular business hours, all of the files, records, books, invoices, documents, payrolls and other data required to be established and maintained by OAKLAND under Section 4.3, and allow access and the right to examine those items. OAKLAND shall permit the UASI Management Team and City, and UASI Management Team and City employees and authorized representatives, to inspect, audit, examine and make excerpts and transcripts from any of the foregoing. The rights of the UASI Management Team and City pursuant to this Section shall remain in effect so long as OAKLAND has the obligation to maintain such files, records, books, invoices, documents, payrolls and other data under this Article 4. The DHS, the Comptroller General of the United States or designee, and Cal OES shall have the same inspection and audit rights as the City and UASI Management Team. OAKLAND shall cooperate with any federal or state audit.
- 4.5 <u>Audit Report</u>. If the amount specified in Section 3.2 of this agreement is \$750,000 or more, OAKLAND shall submit an organization-wide financial and compliance audit report. The audit must be performed in accordance with GAO's Government Auditing Standards, and 2 CFR Part 200 Subpart F Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards. OAKLAND shall submit its audit report to the UASI Management Team no later than six months after the end of OAKLAND's fiscal year.

ARTICLE 5 REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES

OAKLAND represents and warrants each of the following as of the date of this Agreement and at all times throughout the term of this Agreement:

- 5.1 No Misstatements. No document furnished or to be furnished by OAKLAND to the UASI Management Team or to City in connection with this Agreement, any Reimbursement Request or any other document relating to any of the foregoing, contains or will contain any untrue statement of material fact or omits or will omit a material fact necessary to make the statements contained therein not misleading, under the circumstances under which any such statement shall have been made.
- 5.2 <u>Eligibility to Receive Federal Funds</u>. By executing this Agreement, OAKLAND certifies that it is eligible to receive federal funds, and specifically certifies as follows:
- (a) OAKLAND is not suspended, debarred or otherwise excluded from participation in federal assistance programs, as required by Executive Order 12549 and 12689, "Debarment and Suspension" and implemented at 2 CFR Part 3000.

- (b) OAKLAND complies with 31 U.S.C. §1352, Limitation on use of appropriated funds to influence federal contracting and financial transactions, as implemented at 44 CFR Part 18 and 6 CFR Part 9.
- (c) OAKLAND complies with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988, as amended, 41 U.S.C. §701 et seq., as implemented in 2 CFR Part 3001, and will continue to provide a drug-free workplace as required under that Act and implementing regulations.
- (d) OAKLAND is not delinquent in the repayment of any federal debt. See OMB Circular A-129.

OAKLAND acknowledges that these certifications of eligibility to receive federal funds are material terms of the Agreement.

NIMS Compliance. To be eligible to receive Grant Funds, OAKLAND must meet National Incident Management System ("NIMS") compliance requirements, and report full NIMS compliance via the National Incident Management System Capability Assessment Support Tool ("NIMSCAST"). By executing this Agreement, OAKLAND certifies that it is in full NIMS compliance, and that it has reported that compliance via the NIMSCAST. OAKLAND shall provide documentation of its NIMS compliance to the UASI Management Team. OAKLAND acknowledges that this certification is a material term of the Agreement.

ARTICLE 6 INDEMNIFICATION AND GENERAL LIABILITY

- **Indemnification.** OAKLAND shall indemnify, protect, defend and hold harmless each of the Indemnified Parties from and against any and all Losses arising from, in connection with or caused by OAKLAND's performance of this Agreement, including, but not limited to, the following: (a) a material breach of this Agreement OAKLAND; (b) a material breach of any representation or warranty of OAKLAND contained in this Agreement; (c) any personal injury or death caused, directly or indirectly, by any act or omission of OAKLAND or its employees, subgrantees or agents; (d) any loss of or damage to property caused, directly or indirectly, by any act or omission of OAKLAND or its employees, subgrantees or agents; (e) the use, misuse or failure of any equipment or facility used by OAKLAND, or by any of its employees, subgrantees or agents, regardless of whether such equipment or facility is furnished, rented or loaned to OAKLAND by an Indemnified Party; (f) any tax, fee, assessment or other charge for which OAKLAND is responsible under Section 10.4; or (g) any infringement of patent rights, copyright, trade secret or any other proprietary right or trademark of any person or entity in consequence of the use by any Indemnified Party of any goods or services furnished by OAKLAND or its employees, subgrantees or agents to such Indemnified Party in connection with this Agreement. The foregoing indemnity shall include, without limitation, reasonable fees of attorneys, consultants and experts and related costs and San Francisco's costs of investigating any claims against San Francisco.
- Duty to Defend; Notice of Loss. OAKLAND acknowledges and agrees that its obligation to defend the Indemnified Parties under Section 6.1: (a) is an immediate obligation, independent of its other obligations hereunder; (b) applies to any Loss which actually or potentially falls within the scope of Section 6.1, regardless of whether the allegations asserted in connection with such Loss are or may be groundless, false or fraudulent; and (c) arises at the time the Loss is tendered to OAKLAND by the Indemnified Party and continues at all times thereafter. The Indemnified Party shall give OAKLAND prompt notice of any Loss under Section 6.1 and OAKLAND shall have the right to defend, settle and compromise any such Loss; provided, however, that the Indemnified Party shall have the right to retain its own counsel at the expense of OAKLAND if representation of such Indemnified Party by the counsel retained by OAKLAND would be inappropriate due to conflicts of interest between such Indemnified

Party and OAKLAND. An Indemnified Party's failure to notify OAKLAND promptly of any Loss shall not relieve OAKLAND of any liability to such Indemnified Party pursuant to Section 6.1, unless such failure materially impairs OAKLAND's ability to defend such Loss. OAKLAND shall seek the Indemnified Party's prior written consent to settle or compromise any Loss if OAKLAND contends that such Indemnified Party shares in liability with respect thereto.

- 6.3 <u>Incidental and Consequential Damages</u>. Losses covered under this Article 6 shall include any and all incidental and consequential damages resulting in whole or in part from OAKLAND's acts or omissions. Nothing in this Agreement shall constitute a waiver or limitation of any rights that any Indemnified Party may have under applicable law with respect to such damages.
- LIMITATION ON LIABILITY OF SAN FRANCISCO. CITY'S OBLIGATIONS UNDER THIS AGREEMENT SHALL BE LIMITED TO THE AGGREGATE AMOUNT OF GRANT FUNDS ACTUALLY DISBURSED HEREUNDER. NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER PROVISION CONTAINED IN THIS AGREEMENT OR ANY OTHER DOCUMENT OR COMMUNICATION RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, IN NO EVENT SHALL CITY BE LIABLE, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER ANY CLAIM IS BASED ON CONTRACT OR TORT, FOR ANY SPECIAL, CONSEQUENTIAL, INDIRECT OR INCIDENTAL DAMAGES, INCLUDING LOST PROFITS, ARISING OUT OF OR IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT, THE GRANT FUNDS, THE GRANT PLAN OR ANY ACTIVITIES PERFORMED IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT.

ARTICLE 7 EVENTS OF DEFAULT AND REMEDIES; TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE

- 7.1 **Events of Default**. The occurrence of any one or more of the following events shall constitute an "Event of Default" under this Agreement:
- (a) <u>False Statement</u>. Any statement, representation, certification or warranty contained in this Agreement, in any Reimbursement Request, or in any other document submitted to the UASI Management Team or to City under this Agreement is found by the UASI Management Team or by City to be false or misleading.
- (b) Failure to Perform Other Covenants. OAKLAND fails to perform or breaches any provision or covenant of this Agreement to be performed or observed by OAKLAND as and when performance or observance is due and such failure or breach continues for a period of ten (10) days after the date on which such performance or observance is due.
- (c) <u>Failure to Comply with Applicable Laws</u>. OAKLAND fails to perform or breaches any of the terms or provisions of Article 12.
- (d) <u>Voluntary Insolvency</u>. OAKLAND (i) is generally not paying its debts as they become due, (ii) files, or consents by answer or otherwise to the filing against it of, a petition for relief or reorganization or arrangement or any other petition in bankruptcy or for liquidation or to take advantage of any bankruptcy, insolvency or other debtors' relief law of any jurisdiction, (iii) makes an assignment for the benefit of its creditors, (iv) consents to the appointment of a custodian, receiver, trustee or other officer with similar powers of OAKLAND or of any substantial part of OAKLAND's property or (v) takes action for the purpose of any of the foregoing.
- (e) <u>Involuntary Insolvency</u>. Without consent by OAKLAND, a court or government authority enters an order, and such order is not vacated within ten (10) days, (i) appointing a custodian, receiver, trustee or other officer with similar powers with respect to OAKLAND or with respect to any substantial part of OAKLAND's property, (ii) constituting an order for relief or approving a petition for

relief or reorganization or arrangement or any other petition in bankruptcy or for liquidation or to take advantage of any bankruptcy, insolvency or other debtors' relief law of any jurisdiction or (iii) ordering the dissolution, winding-up or liquidation of OAKLAND.

- 7.2 **Remedies upon Event of Default.** Upon and during the continuance of an Event of Default, City may do any of the following, individually or in combination with any other remedy:
- (a) <u>Termination</u>. City may terminate this Agreement by giving a written termination notice to OAKLAND and, on the date specified in such notice, this Agreement shall terminate and all rights of OAKLAND hereunder shall be extinguished. In the event of such termination, City will pay OAKLAND for Authorized Expenditures in any Reimbursement Request that was submitted and approved by the UASI Management Team and by City prior to the date of termination specified in such notice.
- (b) Withholding of Grant Funds. City may withhold all or any portion of Grant Funds not yet disbursed hereunder, regardless of whether OAKLAND has previously submitted a Reimbursement Request or whether the UASI Management Team and/or City has approved the disbursement of the Grant Funds requested in any Reimbursement Request. Any Grant Funds withheld pursuant to this Section and subsequently disbursed to OAKLAND after cure of applicable Events of Default shall be disbursed without interest.
- (c) Return of Grant Funds. City may demand the immediate return of any previously disbursed Grant Funds that have been claimed or expended by OAKLAND in breach of the terms of this Agreement, together with interest thereon from the date of disbursement at the maximum rate permitted under applicable law.

7.3 <u>Termination for Convenience</u>.

- (a) City shall have the option, in its sole discretion, to terminate this Agreement, at any time during the term hereof, for convenience and without cause. City shall exercise this option by giving OAKLAND written notice of termination. The notice shall specify the date on which termination shall become effective.
- (b) Upon receipt of the notice, OAKLAND shall commence and perform, with diligence, all actions necessary on the part of OAKLAND to effect the termination of this Agreement on the date specified by City and to minimize the liability of OAKLAND and City to third parties as a result of termination. All such actions shall be subject to the prior approval of the UASI Management Team.
- (c) Within 30 days after the specified termination date, OAKLAND shall submit to the UASI Management Team an invoice for all Authorized Expenses incurred through the termination date. For Authorized Expenses incurred after receipt of the notice of termination, City will only reimburse OAKLAND if the Authorized Expenses received prior approval from the UASI Management Team as specified in subparagraph (b).
- (d) In no event shall City be liable for costs incurred by OAKLAND or any of its contractors or subgrantees after the termination date specified by City.
 - (e) City's payment obligation under this Section shall survive termination of this Agreement.
- 7.4 <u>Remedies Nonexclusive</u>. Each of the remedies provided for in this Agreement may be exercised individually or in combination with any other remedy available hereunder or under applicable laws, rules and regulations. The remedies contained herein are in addition to all other remedies available to City at

law or in equity by statute or otherwise and the exercise of any such remedy shall not preclude or in any way be deemed to waive any other remedy.

ARTICLE 8 ASSIGNMENTS

- 8.1 No Assignment by OAKLAND. OAKLAND shall not, either directly or indirectly, assign, transfer, hypothecate, subcontract or delegate all or any portion of this Agreement or any rights, duties or obligations of OAKLAND hereunder without the prior written consent of the UASI Management Team; provided, however, that any contractor or subgrantee specifically referenced in Appendix A shall not require the consent of Management Team. This Agreement shall not, nor shall any interest herein, be assignable as to the interest of OAKLAND involuntarily or by operation of law without the prior written consent of City. A change of ownership or control of OAKLAND or a sale or transfer of substantially all of the assets of OAKLAND shall be deemed an assignment for purposes of this Agreement.
- 8.2 <u>Agreement Made in Violation of this Article</u>. Any agreement made in violation of Section 8.1 shall confer no rights on any person or entity and shall automatically be null and void.
- 8.3 <u>OAKLAND Retains Responsibility</u>. OAKLAND shall in all events remain liable for the performance by any subgrantee contractor, or assignee of all of the covenants, terms and conditions in this Agreement.

ARTICLE 9 NOTICES AND OTHER COMMUNICATIONS

9.1 Requirements. Unless otherwise specifically provided herein, all notices, consents, directions, approvals, instructions, requests and other communications hereunder shall be in writing, shall be addressed to the person and address set forth below and shall be (a) deposited in the U.S. mail, first class, certified with return receipt requested and with appropriate postage, (b) hand delivered or (c) sent via e-mail:

- 9.2 <u>Effective Date</u>. All communications sent in accordance with Section 9.1 shall become effective on the date of receipt. Such date of receipt shall be determined by: (a) if mailed, the return receipt, completed by the U.S. postal service; (b) if sent via hand delivery, a receipt executed by a duly authorized agent of the party to whom the notice was sent; or (c) if sent via facsimile, the date of telephonic confirmation of receipt by a duly authorized agent of the party to whom the notice was sent or, if such confirmation is not reasonably practicable, the date indicated in the facsimile machine transmission report of the party giving such notice.
- 9.3 <u>Change of Address</u>. From time to time any party hereto may designate a new address or recipient for notice for purposes of this Article 9 by written notice to the other party and the UASI Management Team.

ARTICLE 10 MISCELLANEOUS

- No Waiver. No waiver by San Francisco of any default or breach of this Agreement shall be implied from any failure by the UASI Management Team or San Francisco to take action on account of such default if such default persists or is repeated. No express waiver by San Francisco shall affect any default other than the default specified in the waiver and shall be operative only for the time and to the extent therein stated. Waivers by San Francisco of any covenant, term or condition contained herein shall not be construed as a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same covenant, term or condition. The consent or approval by the UASI Management Team or San Francisco of any action requiring further consent or approval shall not be deemed to waive or render unnecessary the consent or approval to or of any subsequent similar act.
- Modification. This Agreement may not be modified, nor may compliance with any of its terms be waived, except by written instrument executed and approved in the same manner as this Agreement; provided, however, that the General Manager or designee may establish alternate procedures for modification of the Appendix A and the Grant Plan.
- Governing Law; Venue. The formation, interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of California, without regard to its conflict of laws principles. Venue for all litigation relative to the formation, interpretation and performance of this Agreement shall be in San Francisco.
- 10.4 OAKLAND to Pay All Taxes. OAKLAND shall pay to the appropriate governmental authority, as and when due, any and all taxes, fees, assessments or other governmental charges, including possessory interest taxes and California sales and use taxes, levied upon or in connection with this Agreement, the Grant Plan, the Grant Funds or any of the activities contemplated by this Agreement.
- 10.5 <u>Headings</u>. All article and section headings and captions contained in this Agreement are for reference only and shall not be considered in construing this Agreement.

- 10.6 <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement sets forth the entire Agreement between the parties, and supersedes all other oral or written provisions. The following Appendices are attached to and a part of this Agreement:
 - Appendix A, Authorized Expenditures and Timelines
 - Appendix B, Grant Assurances
 - Appendix C, Form of Reimbursement Request
- 10.7 <u>Certified Resolution of Signatory Authority</u>. Upon request of San Francisco, OAKLAND shall deliver to San Francisco a copy of the corporate resolution(s) authorizing the execution, delivery and performance of this Agreement, certified as true, accurate and complete by the appropriate authorized representative of OAKLAND.
- 10.8 <u>Severability</u>. Should the application of any provision of this Agreement to any particular facts or circumstances be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, then (a) the validity of other provisions of this Agreement shall not be affected or impaired thereby, and (b) such provision shall be enforced to the maximum extent possible so as to effect the intent of the parties and shall be reformed without further action by the parties to the extent necessary to make such provision valid and enforceable.
- 10.9 <u>Successors; No Third-Party Beneficiaries</u>. Subject to the terms of Article 8, the terms of this Agreement shall be binding upon, and inure to the benefit of, the parties hereto and their successors and assigns. Nothing in this Agreement, whether express or implied, shall be construed to give any person or entity (other than the parties hereto and their respective successors and assigns and, in the case of Article 6, the Indemnified Parties) any legal or equitable right, remedy or claim under or in respect of this Agreement or any covenants, conditions or provisions contained herein.
- 10.10 <u>Survival of Terms</u>. The obligations of OAKLAND and the terms of the following provisions of this Agreement shall survive and continue following expiration or termination of this Agreement: Sections 4.3 and 4.4, Article 6, this Article 10, and the Grant Assurances of Appendix B.
- 10.11 <u>Further Assurances</u>. From and after the date of this Agreement, OAKLAND agrees to do such things, perform such acts, and make, execute, acknowledge and deliver such documents as may be reasonably necessary or proper and usual to complete the transactions contemplated by this Agreement and to carry out the purpose of this Agreement in accordance with this Agreement.
- Disclosure of Subawards and Executive Compensation. Pursuant to the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA) (P.L. 109-282) as amended by Section 6202(a) of the Government Funding Transparency Act of 2008 (P.L. 110-252), full disclosure to the public of entities or organizations receiving federal funds is now required. As defined by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB), all new Federal awards of \$25,000 or more as of October 1, 2010, are subject to FFATA reporting requirements. The Transparency Act definition of "Federal awards" includes not only prime awards for grantees, cooperators, and contractors, but also awards to sub-recipients. If applicable, OAKLAND must provide the following information on OAKLAND letterhead within 30 days of receipt of this Agreement.
 - 1. Subawards greater than \$25,000:
 - a) Name of entity receiving award;
 - b) Amount of award;
 - c) Funding agency:
 - d) The Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance program number;

- e) Award title (descriptive of the purpose of the funding action);
- f) Location of the entity and primary location of performance including city, state, and Congressional district;
- g) Dun & Bradstreet (D&B) DUNS Number of the entity, and its parent if applicable; and,
- h) Total compensation and names of top five executives (same thresholds as for prime recipients).
- 2. The Total compensation and names of the top five executives if:
 - a) 80% or more of annual gross revenues are from Federal awards (contracts, sub-contracts and Federal financial assistance), and \$25,000,000 or more in annual gross revenues from Federal awards; and,
 - b) Compensation information is not already available through reporting to the Securities and Exchange Commission.

10.13 <u>Cooperation with UASI Programs and Activities.</u>

- (a) Subject to reasonable terms and conditions, OAKLAND agrees to participate in UASI-sponsored exercises, and to make available equipment acquired with Grant Funds for use as part of such exercises.
- (b) To the extent permitted by law, OAKLAND agrees to share with the Approval Authority informational work products (such as plans, reports, data, etc.) created or acquired using Grant Funds.
- (c) OAKLAND agrees to provide input towards the development of the regional Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR) as requested by UASI.

ARTICLE 11 INSURANCE

- 11.1 <u>Types and Amounts of Coverage</u>. Without limiting OAKLAND's liability pursuant to Article 6 of this Agreement, OAKLAND shall maintain in force, during the full term of the Agreement, insurance in the following amounts and coverages:
- (a) Workers' Compensation, in statutory amounts, with Employers' Liability Limits not less than \$1,000,000 each accident, injury, or illness; and
- (b) Commercial General Liability Insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence Combined Single Limit for Bodily Injury and Property Damage, including Contractual Liability, Personal Injury, Products and Completed Operations; and
- (c) Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance with limits not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence Combined Single Limit for Bodily Injury and Property Damage, including Owned, Non-Owned and Hired auto coverage, as applicable.
- 11.2 <u>Additional Requirements for General and Automobile Coverage.</u> Commercial General Liability and Commercial Automobile Liability Insurance policies must be endorsed to provide:

- (a) Name as Additional Insured the City and County of San Francisco, its Officers, Agents, and Employees.
- (b) That such policies are primary insurance to any other insurance available to the Additional Insureds, with respect to any claims arising out of this Agreement, and that insurance applies separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought.
- Additional Requirements Regarding Workers' Compensation. Regarding Workers' Compensation, OAKLAND hereby agrees to waive subrogation which any insurer of OAKLAND may acquire from OAKLAND by virtue of the payment of any loss. OAKLAND agrees to obtain any endorsement that may be necessary to effect this waiver of subrogation. The Workers' Compensation policy shall be endorsed with a waiver of subrogation in favor of the City for all work performed by the OAKLAND, its employees, agents and subcontractors.
- 11.4 <u>Additional Requirements for All Policies</u>. All policies shall provide thirty days' advance written notice to the City of reduction or nonrenewal of coverages or cancellation of coverages for any reason. Notices shall be sent to the City address in Article 9, Notices and Other Communications.
- Required Post-Expiration Coverage. Should any of the required insurance be provided under a claims-made form, OAKLAND shall maintain such coverage continuously throughout the term of this Agreement and, without lapse, for a period of three years beyond the expiration of this Agreement, to the effect that, should occurrences during the Agreement term give rise to claims made after expiration of the Agreement, such claims shall be covered by such claims-made policies.
- General Annual Aggregate Limit/Inclusion of Claims Investigation or Legal Defense Costs. Should any of the required insurance be provided under a form of coverage that includes a general annual aggregate limit or provides that claims investigation or legal defense costs be included in such general annual aggregate limit, such general annual aggregate limit shall be double the occurrence or claims limits specified above.
- Lapse in Insurance. Should any required insurance lapse during the term of this Agreement, requests for reimbursement originating after such lapse may not be processed, in the City's sole discretion, until the City receives satisfactory evidence of reinstated coverage as required by this Agreement, effective as of the lapse date. If insurance is not reinstated, the City may, at its sole option, terminate this Agreement effective on the date of such lapse of insurance.
- 11.8 **Evidence of Insurance.** Before commencing any operations or expending any Grant Funds under this Agreement, OAKLAND shall furnish to City certificates of insurance and additional insured policy endorsements with insurers with ratings comparable to A-, VIII or higher, that are authorized to do business in the State of California, and that are satisfactory to City, in form evidencing all coverages set forth above. Failure to maintain insurance shall constitute a material breach of this Agreement.
- 11.9 <u>Effect of Approval.</u> Approval of the insurance by City shall not relieve or decrease the liability of OAKLAND hereunder.
- 11.10 <u>Insurance for Subcontractors and Evidence of this Insurance.</u> If a subcontractor or subgrantee will be used to complete any portion of this Agreement, OAKLAND shall ensure that the subcontractor or subgrantee shall provide all necessary insurance and shall name the City and County of San Francisco, its officers, agents and employees and the OAKLAND as additional insureds.

11.11 <u>Authority to Self-Insure.</u> Nothing in this Agreement shall preclude OAKLAND from self-insuring all or part of the insurance requirement in this Article. However, OAKLAND shall provide proof of self-insurance, in a form acceptable to San Francisco, in the amounts of each line of self-insurance.

ARTICLE 12 COMPLIANCE

- 12.1 <u>Nondiscrimination</u>. In the performance of this Agreement, OAKLAND agrees not to discriminate against any employee, San Francisco employee working with OAKLAND or any subgrantee of OAKLAND, applicant for employment with OAKLAND or subgrantee of OAKLAND, or against any person seeking accommodations, advantages, facilities, privileges, services, or membership in all business, social, or other establishments or organizations, on the basis of the fact or perception of a person's race, color, creed, religion, national origin, ancestry, age, height, weight, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, domestic partner status, marital status, disability or Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome or HIV status (AIDS/HIV status), or association with members of such protected classes, or in retaliation for opposition to discrimination against such classes.
- Conflict of Interest. Through its execution of this Agreement, OAKLAND acknowledges that it is familiar with the provisions of Section 87100 et seq. and Section 1090 et seq. of the Government Code of the State of California, and certifies that it does not know of any facts which constitutes a violation of said provisions and agrees that it will immediately notify City if it becomes aware of any such fact during the term of this Agreement. OAKLAND agrees that it will promptly notify City in writing of all violations of State or Federal criminal law involving fraud, bribery, or gratuities affecting or involving the use of Grant Funds.
- 12.3 <u>Compliance with ADA</u>. OAKLAND acknowledges that, pursuant to the ADA, programs, services and other activities provided by a public entity to the public, whether directly or through a grantee or contractor, must be accessible to the disabled public. OAKLAND shall not discriminate against any person protected under the ADA in connection with all or any portion of the Grant Plan and shall comply at all times with the provisions of the ADA.
- Prohibition on Political Activity with City Funds. In accordance with San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12G, OAKLAND may not participate in, support, or attempt to influence any political campaign for a candidate or for a ballot measure (collectively, "Political Activity") in the performance of the services provided under this Agreement. OAKLAND agrees to comply with San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 12G and any implementing rules and regulations promulgated by San Francisco's Controller. The terms and provisions of Chapter 12G are incorporated herein by this reference. In the event Contractor violates the provisions of this section, San Francisco may, in addition to any other rights or remedies available hereunder, (i) terminate this Agreement, and (ii) prohibit OAKLAND from bidding on or receiving any new City contract for a period of two (2) years. The Controller will not consider OAKLAND's use of profit as a violation of this section.
- Submitting False Claims; Monetary Penalties. Pursuant to San Francisco Administrative Code §21.35, any contractor, subcontractor or consultant who submits a false claim shall be liable to the City for the statutory penalties set forth in that section. The text of Section 21.35, along with the entire San Francisco Administrative Code is available on the web at http://www.municode.com/Library/clientCodePage.aspx?clientID=4201. A contractor, subcontractor or consultant will be deemed to have submitted a false claim to the City if the contractor, subcontractor or consultant: (a) knowingly presents or causes to be presented to an officer or employee of the City a false claim or request for payment or approval; (b) knowingly makes, uses, or causes to be made or used a false record or statement to get a false claim paid or approved by the City; (c) conspires to defraud the City by getting a false claim allowed or paid by the City; (d) knowingly makes, uses, or causes to be

made or used a false record or statement to conceal, avoid, or decrease an obligation to pay or transmit money or property to the City; or (e) is a beneficiary of an inadvertent submission of a false claim to the City, subsequently discovers the falsity of the claim, and fails to disclose the false claim to the City within a reasonable time after discovery of the false claim.

Reimbursement for Planning Requires:

- **Personnel** Prior to any expenditure for personnel, OAKLAND must submit completed job descriptions to the UASI detailing the planning activities the personnel will complete and the deliverables to be produced. Prior to reimbursement, OAKLAND must submit the following: all functional time sheets, payroll documentation showing payment of salaries and benefits, or cancelled checks; work product or certification that work was completed including a statement of completed activities.
- Contracts All contracts must be pre-approved by the UASI prior to execution. In addition, OAKLAND must satisfy the following quidelines:
 - o Procurement of contractual services must follow local policies and procedures for competitive purchasing (provided they are not in conflict with Federal regulations which supersede them). If sole source approval is needed, OAKLAND must transmit a sole source request to the UASI for submission to the State.
 - The contract must have a clearly stated scope of work and deliverables, deadlines for completion of work, and a schedule of contract payments.
 - o All services must be performed and paid within the grant performance period.
- Travel travel for planning activities must be pre-approved in accordance with the Bay Area UASI Travel Policy (adopted by the Approval Authority in August 2017) prior to scheduling. Invoices must include all backup documentation, including conference agendas, programs, brochures, lodging receipts, per diem calculations, airfare receipts/boarding passes, mileage calculations, other transportation receipts, and proof of payment.

ORGANIZATION

Reimbursement for Organization Requires:

- Personnel Prior to any expenditure for personnel, OAKLAND must submit completed job descriptions to the UASI detailing the
 planning activities the personnel will complete and the deliverables to be produced. Prior to reimbursement, OAKLAND must

EQUIPMENT

Reimbursement for Equipment Requires:

- An approved EHP memo, if applicable.
- A performance bond is required for any equipment item that exceeds \$250,000, or for any vehicle, aircraft, or watercraft, regardless of the cost. Failure to obtain and submit a performance bond to the UASI may result in disallowance of cost.
- As allowable under Federal guidelines, procurement of equipment must follow local policies and procedures for competitive purchasing (provided they are not in conflict with Federal regulations which supersede them). If sole source approval is needed, OAKLAND must transmit the request to the UASI for request to the State.
- Prior to reimbursement, OAKLAND must submit all invoices, AEL numbers, and a list of all equipment ID numbers and the deployed locations.
- OAKLAND must inventory, type, organize and track all equipment purchased in order to facilitate the dispatch, deployment, and recovery of resources before, during, and after an incident.
 - All requests for reimbursements must be submitted within 30 days of project completion unless an earlier deadline is set in this Appendix. OAKLAND should submit reimbursement requests on a quarterly basis, as applicable.
 - Authorized expenditures must fall into one of the following categories: Planning, Organization, Equipment,
 Training, or Exercises. Descriptions of authorized expenditures are in the following documents:

APPROPRIATING FEDERAL RESOLUTION: (1) ACCEPTING AND FISCAL YEAR 2019 URBAN AREA SECURITY INITIATIVE (FY 2019 UASI) GRANT FUNDS FROM THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO IN AN AMOUNT OF UP TO ONE MILLION, FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,050,000.00); (2) APPROVING THE FY 2019 UASI RECOMMENDED GRANT SPENDING PLAN: (3) WAIVING THE ADVERTISING AND COMPETITIVÉ **BIDDING** PURCHASING REQUIREMENTS FOR PROCUREMENT OF EQUIPMENT WHEN REQUIRED BY THE FY 2019 UASI GRANT; (4) AUTHORIZING THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR OR DESIGNEE TO EXPEND SAID GRANT FUNDS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE RECOMMENDED SPENDING CITY'S HIRING THE REOUIREMENTS AND PROGRAMS/POLICIES ARE FOLLOWED; (5) ACCEPTING AND APPROPRIATING ADDITIONAL FY 2019 UASI GRA FUNDS IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED FIFTY PERCENT (50%) OF THE ORIGINAL GRANT AWARD; AND (6) AUTHORIZING USE OF THE GENERAL FUND PURPOSE FUND TO COVER THE COST OF CENTRAL SERVICE OVERHEAD CHARGES AFFILIATED WITH SAID GRANT

WHEREAS, the City and County of San Francisco is the Fiscal Agent for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2019 UASI grant award and an agreement with the City and County of San Francisco is required for the distribution, administration, and reimbursement of grant funds to the City of Oakland; and

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland FY 2019 UASI grant proposal was approved by the Bay Area UASI Approval Authority and the City of Oakland and has been awarded a grant allocation of up to one million, fifty thousand dollars (\$1,050,000.00), for FY 19 UASI performance period from November 1, 2019 through May 31, 2021 as part of an investment to the region; and

WHEREAS, the authorized expenditures estimated at eight hundred seventy-seven thousand, six hundred sixty (\$877,660) for staff positions includes funding to support up to five (5) full-time equivalent (FTE) positions for the FY 2019 UASI Grant period of November 1, 2019 through May 31. 2021, or until funding is exhausted; and

WHEREAS, the Fire Department, Emergency Management Services Division staffing is essential to ensure that Oakland is prepared to support terrorist events and simultaneously prepare for other hazards, including natural disasters and other major incidents that effect the City of Oakland and the Bay Area region; and

WHEREAS, the authorized expenditures estimated at eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) for Critical Infrastructure and Key Resources that will help the Fire Department's Hazardous Material team's capability to conduct gas and vapor chemical detection; and

WHEREAS, the authorized expenditures estimated at ninety-two thousand, three hundred forty dollars (\$92,340) for equipment to support critical communications and data systems coordination and resource allocation tools such WebEOC, satellite communications; and public alert and warning to affected members of the community in order to save lives and property; and

WHEREAS, all equipment in approved and recommended projects are identified on the Federally Authorized Equipment List ("AEL") as required by the UASI FY 2019 grant guidelines; and

WHEREAS, that said FY 2019 grant requirements provide that certain equipment on the spending plan must be purchased from federal government schedules; and

WHEREAS, staff recommends that the City Administrator, or her designee be authorized to make all purchases and enter into contracts identified on the FY 2019 UASI spending plan as identified in the report, without further review or action by the City Council, including purchases that exceed the City Administrators purchasing authority, depending on the type of product or service under Oakland's Purchasing Ordinance, Oakland Municipal Code section 2.04.020; and

WHEREAS, Oakland Municipal Code Section 2.04.050.1.5 permits the City Council to waive the City's advertising, bidding and purchasing requirements upon a finding that it is in the best interest of the City to do so; and

WHEREAS, that City staff recommends that the City Council waive the City's advertising, bidding and purchasing requirements for purchases of equipment from federal spending schedules when required by the FY 2019 UASI grant; and

WHEREAS, the City of Oakland is committed to cooperating with regional partners to protect, prevent, mitigate, respond, and recover from terrorism, and other disasters; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the City Council authorizes the acceptance and appropriation of FY 2019 UASI grant funds from the City and County of San Francisco in the amount up to one million, fifty thousand dollars (\$1,050,000.00); and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that up to one million, fifty thousand dollars (\$1,050,000.00) of said FY 2019 grant funds shall be deposited into U.S. Department of Homeland Security Fund (2123), Emergency Management Services Division Organization (20711), a grant project to be determined, Emergency Management Services/Homeland Security Program (PS21) and/or create program codes from IJ01 through IJ10 to match the corresponding goals of the UASI program; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that said FY 2019 grant funds shall be allocated in an amount estimated at eight hundred seventy-seven thousand, six hundred sixty dollars (\$877,660) for staff positions to support up to five (5) full-time equivalent (FTE) positions for the FY 2019 UASI Grant period of November 1, 2019 through May 31, 2021, or until funding is exhausted, whichever occurs last; and be it

IN COUNCIL OAKLAND CALIFORNIA

FURTHER RESOLVED, that that said FY 2019 grant funds shall be allocated in an amount estimated at eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) for Critical Infrastructure and Key Resources that will help the Hazardous Material team's capabilities with gas and vapor chemical detection; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Administrator or her designee is authorized to approve expenditures estimated at ninety-two thousand, three hundred forty dollars (\$92,340) for equipment to support critical communications and data systems coordination and resource allocation tools such WebEOC, satellite communications; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that City Council authorizes a General Purpose Fund contribution for \$44,919 during City FY 2019-20 and \$22,460 for FY 2020-21 for an estimated total of \$67,379 to cover the City's Central Services Overhead (CSO) charges for disallowed personnel costs associated with the grant; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Administrator or her designee is authorized to make all purchases of equipment and services identified in the FY 2019 UASI spending plan identified in the report without further review or action by the City Council, including purchases that exceed the City Administrator's purchasing authority pursuant to Oakland Municipal Code section 2.04.020; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that pursuant to Oakland Municipal Code Section 2.04.050.1.5 and for the reasons provided above and in the City Administrator's report accompanying this resolution, that the City Council finds it is in the best interest of the City to waive the City's advertising, bidding and purchasing requirements when required by the FY 2019 UASI grant; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that City Council authorizes the acceptance and appropriation of additional FY 2019 USAI grant funding not to exceed fifty percent (50%) of the original amount.
