## **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff Recommends That The City Council Receive An Informational Report On Coronavirus Aid, Relief, And Economic Security (CARES) Act Relief Fund Expenditures.

## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

This report responds to the City Council's request for an update on CARES Act Relief Fund expenditures, and recommendations on Council action, if needed, regarding use of remaining funds. To date, the City has made substantial progress in engaging community partners and identifying contractors to assist with the implementation of CARES Act initiatives. Most of the agreements supporting the spending of these funds are still being completed.

#### **BACKGROUND / LEGISLATIVE HISTORY**

The CARES Act was approved by Congress and signed into law on March 27, 2020. The Act included approximately \$150 billion in stimulus aid to states and local governments with a population of 500,000 or more. The City of Oakland fell short of this population threshold and, as such, did not receive a direct allocation of stimulus aid from the federal government. As part of its budget actions for Fiscal Year (FY) 2020-21, the State of California allocated \$225 million of its CARES Act funding to California cities with populations of 300,000 or more. The City of Oakland's share of the State's CARES Act funds was \$36,994,706.

The Act provides that the funds can be used for COVID-19 related expenses incurred between March 1, 2020 and December 30, 2020. The CARES Act generally limits expenditures to those that are directly related to the COVID-19 health emergency, including second order effects such as economic support arising from business interruptions caused by COVID-19.

On June 23, 2020, the City Council directed CARES Act funding to 17 initiatives as part of the FY 2020-21 Midcycle Budget Amendments. On July 28, 2020, the City Council adopted Resolution 88229 C.M.S. to formally accept the CARES Act funds and expedite their distribution. This resolution also authorized the City Administrator to reallocate CARES Act

funds to any item of appropriation for eligible projects and activities in the City's Fiscal Year 2020-21 mid-cycle budget, as amended on July 21, 2020, to ensure the timely expenditure and avoid the forfeiture of CARES Act funds. In addition, the resolution directed the City Administrator to provide regular reporting to the City Council and the public with respect to status of administering funds, names of recipient organizations, status of expenditures, planned expenditures at risk of not being timely spent, reallocations, and other pertinent information to ensure complete transparency with regard to the City's use of these funds.

## **ANALYSIS AND POLICY ALTERNATIVES**

An update on CARES Act Relief Fund initiatives to date are provided in **Attachment A**, and will be updated in future reports. The update is organized by the initiatives identified in the FY 2020-21 Midcycle Budget Amendments and specifies funding allocations, planned subawardees where they have been identified, and implementation status.

As detailed in **Attachment A**, Departments are working expeditiously to complete funding agreements, and much work remains to be done to expend these funds. In addition to the standard challenges of executing funding agreements, such as City insurance requirements, most of these agreements must also address federal compliance and audit requirements, which can be substantial for organizations not previously subject to these rules.

A working group has been developed across City departments to monitor progress in awarding and expending CARES Act Relief Funds. In the event that under-expenditure appears likely in one or more areas, the City Administrator has been authorized by the City Council to reallocate these funds as needed. In addition, the City retains the option of shifting additional eligible payroll costs to the CARES Act to backfill any shortfall. To date, no such re-allocation need has been identified. Such options will be considered more closely as the implementation of these initiatives progresses, and staff will keep the City Council apprised of any concerns associated with execution of the Council-approved spending plan as well as any proposed reallocations.

### **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff Recommends That The City Council Receive An Informational Report On Coronavirus Aid, Relief, And Economic Security (CARES) Act Relief Fund Expenditures.

### **REASON FOR SUPPLEMENTAL**

At the September 15, 2020 meeting, the City Council continued this report to its meeting scheduled for October 6, 2020, in order to receive additional updates from staff and monitor progress on CARES Act Relief Fund expenditures. The revised Attachment A includes information on project expenditures through September 23, 2020. To date, no need for reallocation has been identified. All council approved expenditures are proceeding.

Additionally, staff was directed to return with information regarding CARES act spending for:

- Jobs related programs: To support unemployed workers impacted by COVID-19, the EWD Workforce Development division has launched a series of virtual job fairs. The first virtual job fair was held on September 24, with a focus on Retail, Hospitality and Other Essential Industries. Upcoming virtual job fairs include Transportation Distribution, Logistics and Advanced Manufacturing in October, Healthcare in November, and Information Technology in December, Information is available at: https://www.oaklandca.gov/news/2020/city-of-oakland-workforce-development-boardto-host-monthly-virtual-job-fairs-through-december
- Fire related costs: In FY 2019-20, \$2.25 million of CARES funds were allocated to the Oakland Fire Department ("OFD") for payroll costs. In FY 2020-21, and additional \$2.75 million was allocated to OFD for payroll costs.
- Helping vendors, including food vendors:
  - EWD Business Development has committed \$25,000 in funding to an event organizer to act as a sponsor to facilitate a safe and organized series of eventsat

Lake Merritt for merchandise vendors, to implement health and safety measures, including distancing and sanitation.

o To support food vendors, EWD is in the final stages of executing a \$75,000 contract with Feed the Hunger Foundation to launch a pilot project to address key challenges that street food vendors face in their efforts to emerge from the informal economy. This support will include access to capital to purchase units and/or equipment that can meet regulatory standards and technical assistance to pursue the necessary steps to formalize and sustain their businesses.

Staff recommends that the City Council receive an informational report on Coronavirus Aid, Relief, And Economic Security (CARES) Act Relief Fund expenditures.
