Subject: 2026 State and Federal Legislative Agenda

SUMMARY

Townsend Public Affairs, Inc. (TPA) has prepared this report for the City of Oakland as we look ahead to 2026. TPA met with City leadership and based on those meetings has prepared a recommended State and Federal Legislative agenda for discussion and adoption. This includes the framework for legislative proposals for the 2026 legislative year, including City-sponsored legislative proposals, legislative and funding priorities, and projects for consideration for competitive grant programs.

It is expected that the State Legislature in 2026 will maintain its focus on its recent priorities including efforts to counter federal actions, homelessness and behavioral health, housing and greater access, public safety, and transportation and infrastructure. This will also be Governor Newsom's final year in office. The State Legislature is currently in interim recess and will reconvene on January 5, 2026 to resume legislative activities. Legislators may begin introducing new pieces of legislation, many of which may be like bills that did not advance in 2025, the second year of the two-year legislative cycle.

In Washington, DC, Congressional Leaders and the White House have primarily focused on non-local issues, though opportunities remain in infrastructure, transportation, housing, and public safety. Many funding opportunities and programs are restarting operations following mass layoffs of federal civil service employees and structural changes to program administration. The federal government shutdown having significantly delayed legislative action this fall, we expect substantive activity in the Spring of 2026.

City of Oakland Legislative Priorities for 2026

This report reflects the City of Oakland's legislative agenda for 2026, but it will be necessary to remain nimble and responsive as we move through the state and federal legislative year. In this report, TPA has included input from the Mayor, City Council, and City Administration. This report is compiled into three sections:

1. City of Oakland Specific Legislative Priorities for Sponsorship;
2. State and Federal Legislative Priorities and Funding Opportunities to Support; and
3. One-time State and Federal Funding Priorities for "Member Request" Consideration.

The City of Oakland also works closely with and support various measures that are of importance to our regional partners such as: Oakland Unified School District, Port of Oakland, Alameda County, Metropolitan Transportation Commission, Alameda County Transportation Commission, Oakland's transit agencies, as well as other cities, employers, and key sectors. We also partner with local institutions such as the Oakland Museum of California, Oakland Zoo, Chabot Space and Science Center, Children's Fairyland and others.

City of Oakland Specific Legislative Priorities

If the City Council is supportive of the proposals listed below, TPA will continue to research what can be accomplished through legislation, regulations, or direct advocacy with State/Federal agencies and other organizations.

- 1. Supporting the Unhoused** – Based on extensive discussions with the Mayor, City Council, and City Administration, addressing homelessness continues to be the City's foremost legislative and funding priority. The City remains committed to protecting and expanding the Homeless Housing, Assistance, and Prevention (HHAP) funding stream while advocating for the continuation and enhancement of proven programs such as Project Homekey and Encampment Resolution Funding. Efforts will also focus on ensuring sustainable operational support for transitional and permanent supportive housing, including wraparound services that promote long-term stability and self-sufficiency. The City will pursue state and federal resources to strengthen housing navigation, mental and behavioral health support, and workforce development programs that help residents transition out of homelessness. In addition, seek to create opportunities that help provide forms of income for the unhoused while focusing on interim and permanent supportive housing. In partnership with regional and nonprofit partners, the TPA/Oakland will continue advancing comprehensive, coordinated solutions that prevent displacement, increase access to affordable housing, and promote equity and dignity for unhoused individuals and families.
- 2. Illegal Dumping and Blight** – Addressing illegal dumping and urban blight remains a critical priority for improving Oakland's quality of life, advancing economic development, and strengthening public confidence in neighborhood safety. The City seeks to pursue a comprehensive approach that combines enforcement, prevention, education, and investment. Key strategies include strengthening penalties for individuals and entities responsible for illegal dumping, expanding collaboration with contractors, property owners, and waste haulers to ensure compliance with local ordinances, and increasing public education and outreach to deter dumping and promote responsible waste disposal. Working to remove abandoned autos, RVs, and trailers off of city streets. Additionally, the City will advocate for state and federal funding to support capital improvements such as barriers, lighting, and surveillance infrastructure to help prevent recurring dumping in known hotspots. In addition, graffiti vandalism is at times an initiator of blight and tools and funding are required to help adequately address it.
- 3. Public safety** – This remains a top priority for City leaders, with a continued commitment to fostering safe, resilient, and well-supported communities. The City is enhancing partnerships with the California Highway Patrol (CHP) to provide expanded coverage and coordinated enforcement support throughout Oakland. This collaboration aims to improve response times, deter crime, and strengthen overall neighborhood safety. In addition, the TPA/Oakland team will investigate opportunities to fund police academies, seek efforts to fund technology enhancements to help modernize policing efforts, most effective ways to address sex trafficking and sexually exploited minors, and other such programs. In

addition, the City is expanding proven community-based safety initiatives such as the Street Ambassadors Program, which provides on-the-ground engagement, conflict mediation, and resource connections to residents and visitors. These programs have been instrumental in building trust, reducing low-level disturbances, and improving public spaces. The City is also intensifying its focus on fire prevention and emergency preparedness, particularly in the Oakland Hills, where reducing wildfire risk remains a critical priority. Ongoing initiatives include targeted vegetation management, home hardening education, enhanced community outreach to promote defensible space, emergency readiness, working on the High Fire Hazard Severity Zone maps, and other efforts.

4. *Economic Inclusion* – To strengthen Oakland’s economic foundation and promote inclusive growth, the City remains committed to empowering small businesses and local entrepreneurs. Efforts include expanding access to grants and financial assistance for capital improvements, security enhancements, technical support that help stabilize and grow neighborhood-serving enterprises, support for the Coliseum development and other projects that will help grow local businesses, and other efforts. These initiatives aim to revitalize commercial corridors, enhance safety and visibility for small business owners, and foster equitable participation in the city’s economic development. In addition, the City will continue advocating for state and federal funding opportunities that support minority-owned, women-owned, and emerging local businesses, ensuring that Oakland’s diverse entrepreneurial community can thrive in an increasingly competitive marketplace, along with support for retail organizations and their footprint in Oakland.

Federal and State Legislative Themes for Potential Action

The following legislative priorities have been identified by the Mayor, City Council, and City Administration. As legislative proposals are put forward, the TPA Team researches these opportunities and makes recommendations on potential action/next steps. The Mayor and/or City Council may choose to take a formal position on specific legislation, continue monitoring without a position, or determine that no further action is needed.

TPA also maintains and provides up-to-date matrices of state and federal bills relevant to the City’s priorities, providing analysis and information to support the development of informed policy positions. These legislative and funding themes include:

One Time State and Federal Funding Priorities for “Member Request” Consideration

As we have seen at both the Federal and State level, new initiatives and various funding opportunities have taken form over the last few years. This also includes both legislative provisions that direct approved funds to be spent on specific projects, sometimes referred to as “Member Requests” or “Congressionally Directed Spending”, along with competitive grant applications. As it relates to the competitive grant applications, TPA will continue our proactive efforts and immediately notify the city of funding opportunities as they arise.

As it relates to state and federal “Member Requests/Congressionally Directed Spending”, our recommended strategy is for the adopted Legislative Platform to include a handful of funding buckets that capture various project themes. This provides the City with the highest amount of flexibility as it is important to not only reflect the priorities of the state and federal lawmakers who sponsor these requests, but also to ensure that the City’s projects fit the eligibility requirements of the various state and federal funding sources.

These buckets include:

- Affordable Housing/Homelessness, which may include funding for Oakland affordable housing projects that are nearing full financing, operating subsidy for deeply affordable housing, funding to support various efforts to address the unhoused, and other similar efforts.
- Reimaging Public Safety which could include funding for violence prevention efforts, community ambassadors, technology and communication enhancements, fire apparatus replacement, fire personnel protective equipment upgrades, and other similar efforts.
- Infrastructure Improvements which could include funding for enhancements to the Coliseum project area, capital improvements to reduce speeding, illegal dumping, and other public safety related concerns.
- Economic Development which could include funding for small business support, job training programs, career technical training, expansion of guaranteed income, and other related efforts.
- Climate Resiliency which could include funding for investments in nature-based climate adaptation, wildfire prevention and hardening, heat-resilience measures, flood- and stormwater-management upgrades, drought adaptation, and other projects that strengthen community resilience to climate impacts.
